PREAMBLE

PART I
GENERAL PROVISIONS

CHAPTER I
PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS

SECTION 1. - TITLE AND SCOPE - This Ordinance shall be known and cited as the 'Environment Code of the City of Malolos'. It covers all general and special administrative ordinances enacted over the years, Sangguniang Bayan and City Resolutions, as well as provisions from Executive Orders issued by the Local Chief Executive that partake the nature of ordinances relevant to the protection, preservation, conservation, utilization and management of the environment, especially along the areas of land, air and water within the territorial jurisdiction of the City of Malolos.

SECTION 2. - STATEMENT OF PURPOSE - The purpose of the Code is to integrate the planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of programs, projects and activities on the Land Resources Management. Air Quality Control and Water and Marine Resource Management through effective and efficient legislative enactments with the end in view of attaining a healthful and sustainable environment in the exercise of trusteeship of the environment for future generation vis-à-vis promoting livelihood for fisheries, agriculture, agri-tourism and agri-business o sustain economic growth of the City.

SECTION 3. - DECLARATION OF POLICY - Cognizant of the enormous promise and opportunity for prosperity offered by the quality, quantity, diversity and sustainability of our environment and natural resources, it is a declared policy of the city government to secure for the enjoyment of present and future Maloleño the perpetual existence of adequate environment and natural resources in order to support indefinitely the sustainable development of the city.

SECTION 4. - FORM AND STYLE - Some provisions of this Code preserved the original text and form of ordinances and resolutions in which they were passed, while others have been rewritten in the process of consolidation or simply for the sake of clarity, brevity and style.

SECTION 5. - REFERENCE TO CODE - Whenever reference is made to any portion of this Code the reference applies to all amendments and additions now or hereafter made.

SECTION 6. - RELATION OF CODE TO PRIOR ORDINANCES - The provisions of this Code in so far as they bear substantially the same subject matter as the ordinances included in this codification shall be construed as restatements and continuations and not as new enactments.

SECTION 7. - CONFLICT WITHIN DIFFERENT SECTIONS - Should the provisions of the different sections in this Code conflict or contravene with one another ordinance, the provisions of this Code shall govern. The original ordinances shall be applied suppletorily.

SECTION 8. - EXISTING OFFICES - All persons who are holding office, at the time this Code takes effect, will continue to hold them according to their tenur

SECTION 9. - EXISTING RIGHTS - No action or proceeding commenced before this Code takes effect, and no right accrued shall be affected by this Code and procedures thereafter taken shall conform to the provisions of this Code insofar, as possible. The Chapter and section headings do not in any manner affect the scope, meaning, or intent of the provision of the Code.


SECTION 10. - NUMBERING OF ORDINANCES - The CECM shall be recorded and identified as City Ordinance No. 11-2023 denotes the year the CECM was approved and adopted, letter "C" for "CODE" denotes a new series of legislative acts by the City Government, while 11 refers to the first in the order of such new ordinances, which henceforth, are to be numbered consecutively and in perpetuity.

SECTION 11. - RULES OF CONSTRUCTION - In construing the provisions of this Code, the following rules of construction shall be observed unless inconsistent with the manifest intent of the provisions.

a. **General Rules** - All words and phrases shall be construed and understood according to the common and approved usage of the language; but the technical words and phrases and such other words in this Code which may have acquired a peculiar or appropriate meaning shall be construed and understood according to such technical, peculiar or appropriate meaning.





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- b. **Gender and Number** - Every word in the Code importing the masculine gender shall extend to both male and female (gender-neutral). Every word importing the singular number shall apply to several persons or things as well; and every word importing the plural number shall extend and be applied to one person or thing as well.
 - c. **Reasonable Time** - In all cases where any act is required to be done within the reasonable time, the same shall be deemed to mean such time as may be necessary for the prompt performance of the act.
 - d. **Computation of Time** - The time within which an act is to be done as provided in this Code, or in any rule or regulation issued pursuant to the provisions thereof, when expressed in days, shall be computed by excluding the first day and including the last day, except if the last day falls on a weekend (Saturday or Sunday) or holiday whether National or Local, in which case the same shall be excluded in the computation and the business day following shall be considered the last day.
 - e. **References** - All references to chapters, articles, or sections are to the Chapters, Articles or Section in this Code unless otherwise specified.
 - f. **Conflicting Provisions of Chapters** - If the provisions of different chapters conflict with or contravene each other, the provisions of each chapter shall prevail as to all specific matters and questions involved therein.
 - g. **Conflicting Provisions of Sections** - If the provisions of the different sections in the same article conflict with each other, the provisions of the Section which is the last in point of sequence shall prevail.


**CHAPTER II
GOVERNING PRINCIPLES AND POLICIES**

SECTION 12. - GOVERNING PRINCIPLES.

- a. **Vision Statement** - Malolos is envisioned as a world class City in the future giving priority to its duty and responsibility to commence, maintain and protect the wealth, beauty and life supporting elements of its environment and natural resources for sustainable development in economics and political and social impact achieving full cooperation for NGA's, NGO's and public sector. Vision that builds confident and stimulating atmosphere for all to move forward by creating a positive environment for orderly business and economic growth, by recopying on past and conclusion using an experience to guide future decision making.
- b. **Commitment** - The City Government hereby commits to effectively and efficiently implement this code and in support thereof to make available adequate manpower, funding, equipment, machinery and other resources to attain the status of being an "Environment-Friendly City".

Other principles involved in the formulation of the Code:

- a. **Integration** - Characterized by comprehensive scope, coherent and consistent strategies and cost-effectiveness of results of the policy making and implementation processes to be undertaken. Integration is the principle behind the mandate for the City to translate and implement development and national policies, plans and programs in the local level.
- b. **Interdisciplinary** - Refers to the recognition of the need to a diverse field of knowledge to include natural, social, technological and engineering sciences inside from available traditional knowledge.


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


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- c. **Precautionary Principle** - The city government will take immediate action, using the best available knowledge and technology, in situations where there are reason to think that something is causing a potentially severe or irreparable environment harm-even in the absence of conclusive scientific evidence establishing a causal link. This principle also applies in the formulation of predictive policies in Local Environment Management.
 - d. **Polluter Pay Principles** - Polluters shall pay the external costs of pollution inflicted in the community and damages caused to the physical environment.
 - e. **Intergenerational Equity** - That means ensuring equal access to goods and resources for people in the present and future generations.
 - f. **Public Participation** - That which consists in the appropriate access to information held by public authorities and the participation of the general public in the decision making process. This is necessary for stakeholders to gain a sense of ownership to the issues sought to be addressed, and to the interventions and solutions which are decided upon as necessary. This is also a way to decentralize responsibility to environment protection, preservation and conservation and ultimately empower communities without using the coercive power of the state.
 - g. **Community Based Management** - In recognition of effective traditional practices in environment management, as well as the right and duty of local communities to protect, preserve and conserve the environment and natural heritage. The community-based sector shall be given priority rights to manage such activities.
 - h. **Parts of Administrative Code of Malolos and CLUP** - Ordinances or parts of the Administrative Code of Malolos and the Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP) relating to environment protection are incorporated herein.
 - i. **Reward and Punishment System** - This code provides for reward for those individual, corporations or group who follows/obeys the existing rules and regulations respecting the protection of the environment which they ought to perform while providing for penalty for those who abuse, misuse and exploit the environment that causes adverse effect to it.
 - j. This Code is the enabling instrument on the performances required of local officials in relation to the Clean Air Act, Solid Waste Management Act, Clean Water Act and other pertinent laws and regulations issued by competent authority.


SECTION 13. - ENVIRONMENT ASSESSMENT POLICIES - The City hereby adopts policies that will promote environment-friendly activities of commerce and industry, as well as settlements in the urban and suburbs.


There shall be conducted a periodic as the need arises inspection of business sites and premises to assess/determine the preservation of the physical environment. Any degradation, destruction or violation of the environment shall be meted with appropriate and immediate action.

SECTION 14. - ANNUAL ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENTS - On the operations, premises, facilities and systems of all industrial, manufacturing and similar business establishments the City Environment and Natural Resources Office (Division as per Reorganization) (CENRO) shall conduct an annual environment assessment. Such findings shall be used as basis for policies on remedial measures.


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

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
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SECTION 15. - BASES FOR ACTION - Considering the extent and complexity of environmental initiatives, the following national policy instruments, international policy instruments and action programs are hereby considered to ensure an efficient and sustainable, allocation, utilization, management and development of the city's natural resources, to wit:

- a. **The 1987 Constitution of the Philippines.** The constitution provides that: article II, Section 16 "The state shall protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology in accordance with the rhythm and harmony of nature".
- b. **Section 484 of R.A. 7160** otherwise known as the **Local Government Code of 1991** provides for the appointment of an Environment and Natural Resources Officer for the city, whose tasks include the formulation of measures for the consideration, assistance and support to the mayor in carrying out measures to ensure the delivery of basic services and provision of adequate facilities relative to environment and natural resources services as provided for under Section 17 of the Local Government Code. Section 458 (a)(1)(vi), R.A. 7160, directs the Sangguniang Panlungsod to enact ordinances that will protect the environment and impose appropriate penalties for act which endanger the environment, such as dynamite fishing and other forms of destructive fishing, illegal logging and smuggling of logs, smuggling of natural resources products and of endangered species of flora and fauna, slash and burn farming, and such other activities which result in pollution, acceleration of eutrophication of rivers and lakes or of ecological imbalance.
- c. **NIPAS Law (National Integrated Protected Areas System) R.A. 7568.** This is the classification and administration of designated protected areas to maintain essential ecological preserve, presence genetic diversity, ensure sustainable use of resources and maintain their natural conditions for the greatest extent possible.
- d. **Rio Declaration (U.N. Conference on Environment and Development) Local Authorities Initiatives in Support to Agenda 21,** Local Authorities construct, operate and maintain economics, social and environmental infrastructure oversee planning processes, establish local environment policies and regulations and assist in implementing national and sub-national environmental policies. As the local government closest to the people, they play a pivotal role in educating, mobilizing and responding to the public to promote sustainable development.
- e. The city recognizes the roles and powers of national government agencies in the enhancement of environmental initiatives to the extent that local autonomy and devolution are further strengthened. Any fair and reasonable doubt as to the existence of the power shall be interpreted in favor of the local government unit in accordance with Section 5 (a), RA 7160.
- f. **Republic Act No. 9275** also known as the **Philippine Clean Water Act of 2004,** which provides that the state shall pursue a policy of economic growth in a manner consistent with the protection, preservation and revival of the quality of our fresh, brackish and marine waters. To achieve this end, the framework for sustainable development shall be pursued. As such, it shall be the policy of the State:
 - a. To streamline processes and procedures in the prevention, control and abatement of pollution of the country's water resources;
 - b. To promote environmental strategies, use of appropriate economic instruments and of control mechanisms for the protection of water resources;




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
- c. To formulate a holistic national program of water quality management that recognizes that water quality management issues cannot be separated from concerns about water sources and ecological protection, water supply, public health and quality of life;
 - d. To formulate an integrated water quality management framework through proper delegation and effective coordination of functions and activities;
 - e. Promote commercial and industrial processes and products that are environment friendly and energy efficient;
 - f. To encourage cooperation and self-regulation among citizens and industries through the application of incentives and market-based instruments and to promote the role of private industrial enterprises in shaping its regulatory profile within the acceptable boundaries of public health and environment;
 - g. To provide for a comprehensive management program for water pollution focusing on pollution prevention;
 - h. To promote public information and education and to encourage the participation of an informed and active public in water quality management and monitoring;
 - i. To formulate and enforce a system of accountability for short and long-term adverse environmental impact of a project, program or activity; and
 - j. To encourage civil society and other sectors, particularly labor, the academe and business undertaking environment-related activities in their efforts to organize, educate and motivate the people in addressing pertinent environmental issues and problems at the local and national levels.
- d. DENR Administrative Order 34, series of 1990 or the Revised Water Usage and Classification/Water Quality Criteria which declares that the quality of Philippine waters shall be maintained in a safe and satisfactory condition according to their best usages.
- e. DENR Administrative Order 35 series of 1991 or the Revised Effluent Regulations of 1990 which provides for stiffer and stricter policies for water classification.
- f. Presidential Decree 856 or Sanitation Code of the Philippines.
- g. Presidential Decree 1152 entitled Consolidating the Philippine Environment Code which aims to achieve and maintain such levels of air quality as to protect public health; and (b) to prevent to the greatest extent practicable, injury and/or damage to plant and animal life and property, and promote the social and economic development of the country.
- h. Republic Act No. 6969 or Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990. It is the policy of the State to regulate, restrict or prohibit the importation, manufacture, processing, sale, distribution, use and disposal of chemical substances and mixtures that present unreasonable risk and/or injury to health or the environment; to prohibit the entry, even in transit, of hazardous and nuclear wastes and their disposal into the Philippine territorial limits for whatever purpose; and to provide advancement and facilitate research and studies on toxic chemicals.
- i. Republic Act No. 6957 as amended by Republic Act No. 7718 or the Build-Operate-Transfer Law, It is the declared policy of the State to recognize the indispensable role of the private sector as the main engine for national growth and development and provide the most appropriate favorable incentives to mobilize private resources for the purpose.
- j. DENR Administrative Order No. 98-49, also known as, Technical Guidance for Municipal Solid Waste Disposal.


k. **Republic Act No. 9003 or the Solid Waste Management Act of 2000**, which provides: It is hereby declared the policy of the State to adopt a systematic, comprehensive and ecological solid waste management program which shall:

- a. Ensure the protection of the public health and environment;
- b. Utilize environmentally-sound methods that maximize the utilization of valuable resources and encourage resource conservation and recovery;
- c. Set guidelines and targets for solid waste avoidance and volume reduction through source reduction and waste minimization measures, including composting, recycling, re-use, recovery, green charcoal process, and others, before collection, treatment and disposal in appropriate and environmentally sound solid waste management facilities in accordance with ecologically sustainable development principles;
- d. Ensure the proper segregation, collection, transport, storage, treatment and disposal of solid waste through the formulation and adoption of the best environmental practice in ecological waste management excluding incineration;
- e. Promote national research and development programs for improved solid waste management and resource conservation techniques, more effective institutional arrangement and indigenous and improved methods of waste reduction, collection, separation and recovery;
- f. Encourage greater private sector participation in solid waste management;
- g. Retain primary enforcement and responsibility of solid waste management with local government units while establishing a cooperative effort among the national government, other local government units, non- government organizations, and the private sector;
- h. Encourage cooperation and self-regulation among waste generators through the application of market-based instruments;
- i. Institutionalize public participation in the development and implementation of national and local integrated, comprehensive, and ecological waste management programs; and
- j. Strength the integration of ecological solid waste management and resource conservation and recovery topics into the academic curricula of formal and non-formal education in order to promote environmental awareness and action among the citizenry.


l. **Republic Act No. 8749 or Philippine Clean Air Act of 1999**, which mandates; The State shall pursue a policy of balancing development and environmental protection. To achieve this end, the frame work for sustainable development shall be pursued. It shall be the policy of the State to:

- a. Formulate a holistic national program of air pollution management that shall be implemented by the government through proper delegation and effective coordination of functions and activities;
- b. Encourage cooperation and self-regulation among citizens and industries through the application of market-based instruments;
- c. Focus primarily on pollution prevention rather than on control and provide for a comprehensive management program for air pollution;
- d. Promote public information and education and to encourage the participation of an informed and active public in air quality planning and monitoring; and
- e. Formulate and enforce a system of accountability for short and long-term adverse environmental impact of a project, program or activity. This shall include the setting up of a funding or guarantee mechanism for clean-up and environmental rehabilitation and compensation for personal damages.




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- m. **Republic Act No. 8550 or the Philippine Fisheries Code of 1998**, it is hereby declared the policy of the State: to achieve food security as the overriding consideration in the utilization, management, development, conservation and protection of fishery resources in order to provide the food needs of the population. A flexible policy towards the attainment of food security shall be adopted in response to changes in demographic trends for fish, emerging trends in the trade of fish and other aquatic products in domestic and international markets, and the law of supply and demand.
 - n. **Presidential Decree No. 1181** entitled "Providing for the Prevention, Control and Abatement of Air Pollution from Motor Vehicles".
 - o. **Presidential Decree No. 1586**, known as, **The Environmental Impact Assessment System**.
 - p. **Executive Order No. 247, series of 1995**, entitled "Prescribing Guidelines and Establishing a Regulatory Framework for the Prospecting of Biological and Genetic Resources, their By-Products and Derivatives for Scientific and Commercial Purposes.
 - q. **Republic Act No. 8435 or the Agricultural and Fisheries Modernization Act**, which provides, the state shall empower the agricultural and fisheries sector to develop and sustain themselves. Toward this end, the State shall ensure the development of the agriculture and fisheries sectors in accordance with the following principles:
 - a. **Poverty Alleviation and Social Equity** - The State shall ensure that the poorer sectors of society have equitable access to resources, income opportunities, basic and support services and infrastructure especially in areas where productivity is low as a means of improving their quality of life compared with other sectors of society;
 - b. **Food Security** - The State shall assure the availability, adequacy, accessibility of food supplies to all at all times;
 - c. **Rational Use of Resources** - The State shall adopt a rational approach in the allocation of public investments in agriculture and fisheries in order to assure efficiency and effectiveness in the use of scarce resources and thus obtain optimal returns on its investments;
 - d. **Global Competitiveness** - The State shall enhance the competitiveness of the agriculture and fisheries sectors in both domestic and foreign markets;
 - e. **Sustainable Development** - The State shall promote development that is compatible with the preservation of the ecosystem in areas where agriculture and fisheries activities are carried out. The State should exert care and judicious use of the country's natural resources in order to attain long-term sustainability;
 - f. **People Empowerment** - The State shall promote people empowerment by enabling all citizens through direct participation or through their duly elected, chosen or designated representatives the opportunity to participate in policy formulation and decision-making by establishing the appropriate mechanisms and by giving them access to information; and
 - g. **Protection from Unfair Competition** - The State shall protect small farmers and fisher folk from unfair competition such as monopolistic and oligopolistic practices by promoting a policy environment that provides them priority access to credit and strengthened cooperative-based marketing system.
 - u. **CITY ORDINANCE NO. 38-2017** also known as "AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING ALL SUBDIVISION OWNERS, DEVELOPERS OR CONTRACTORS TO PLANT TREES ON THE SITE DEVELOPMENT/SUBDIVISION, TO INCLUDE THE SAME IN THE PROJECT PROPOSAL/SUBDIVISION PLAN, PRESCRIBING PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF, APPROPRIATING FUNDS, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.



DEFINITION OF TERMS


SECTION 16. - DEFINITION: AS USED IN LAND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT - The following terms are conceptually and/or operationally defined as follows:


- a. Agricultural waste shall refer to waste generated from planting or harvesting of crops, trimming or pruning of plants and wastes or run-off materials from farms or fields;
- b. Bulky wastes shall refer to waste materials which cannot be appropriately placed in separate containers because of either its bulky size, shape or other physical attributes. These include large worn-out or broken household, commercial, and industrial items such as furniture, lamps, bookcases, filing cabinets, and other similar items;
- c. Bureau shall refer to the Environmental Management Bureau;
- d. Buy-back center shall refer to a recycling center that purchases of otherwise accepts recyclable materials from the public for the purpose of recycling such materials;
- e. Collection shall refer to the act of removing solid waste from the source or from a communal storage point;
- f. Composting shall refer to the controlled decomposition of organic matter by micro-organisms, mainly bacteria and fungi, into a humus-like product;
- g. Consumer electronics shall refer to special waste that includes worn-out, broken, and other discarded items such as radios, stereos, and TV sets;







- h. Controlled dump shall refer to a disposal site at which solid waste is deposited in accordance with the minimum prescribed standards of site operation;
 - i. Department shall refer to the Department of Environment and Natural Resources;
 - j. Disposal shall refer to the discharge, deposit, dumping, spilling, leaking or placing of any solid waste into or in an land;
 - k. Disposal site shall refer to a site where solid waste is finally discharged and deposited;
 - l. Ecological solid waste management shall refer to the systematic administration of activities which provide for segregation at source, segregated transportation, storage, transfer, processing, treatment, and disposal of solid waste and all other waste management activities which do not harm the environment;
 - m. Environmentally acceptable shall refer to the quality of being re-usable, biodegradable or compostable, recyclable and not toxic or hazardous to the environment;
 - n. Generation shall refer to the act or process of producing solid waste;
 - o. Generator shall refer to a person, natural or juridical, who last uses a material and makes it available for disposal or recycling;
 - p. Hazardous waste shall refer to solid waste management or combination of solid waste which because of its quantity, concentration or physical, chemical or infectious characteristics may:
 - 1. cause, or significantly contribute to an increase in mortality or an increase in serious irreversible, or incapacitating reversible, illness; or
 - 2. pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment when improperly treated, stored, transported, or disposed of, or otherwise managed;
 - q. Leachate shall refer to the liquid produced when waste undergo decomposition, and when water percolate through solid waste undergoing decomposition. It is contaminated liquid that contains dissolved and suspended materials;
 - r. Materials recovery facility - includes a solid waste transfer station or sorting station, drop-off center, a composting facility, and a recycling facility;
 - s. Municipal waste shall refer to wastes produced from activities within local government units which include a combination of domestic, commercial, institutional and industrial wastes and street litters;
 - t. Open dump shall refer to a disposal area wherein the solid wastes are indiscriminately thrown or disposed of without due planning and consideration for environmental and Health standards.
 - u. Opportunity to recycle shall refer to the act of providing a place for collecting source-separated recyclable material, located either at a disposal site or at another location more convenient to the population being served, and collection at least once a month of source-separated recyclable material from collection service customers and to providing a public education and promotion program that gives notice to each person of the opportunity to recycle and encourage source separation of recyclable material;
 - v. Person(s) shall refer to any being, natural or judicial, susceptible of rights and obligations, or of being the subject of legal relations;

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
- w. Post-consumer material shall refer only to those materials or products generated by a business or consumer which have served their intended end use, and which have been separated or diverted from solid waste for the purpose of being collected, processed and used as a raw material in the manufacturing of recycled product, excluding materials and by-products generated from, and by-products generated from, and commonly used within an original manufacturing process, such as mill scrap;
- x. Receptacles shall refer to individual containers used for the source separation and the collection of recyclable materials;
- y. Recovered material shall refer to material and by products that have been recovered or diverted from solid waste for the purpose of being collected, processed and used as a raw material in the manufacture of a recycled product;
- z. Recyclable material shall refer to any waste material retrieved from the waste stream and free from contamination that can still be converted into suitable beneficial use or for other purposes, including, but not limited to, newspaper, ferrous scrap metal, non-ferrous scrap metal, used oil, corrugated cardboard, aluminum, glass, office paper, tin cans and other materials as may be determined by the Commission;
- aa. Recycled material shall refer to post-consumer material that has been recycled and returned to the economy;
- bb. Recycling shall refer to the treating of used or waste materials through a process of making them suitable for beneficial use and for other purposes, and includes any process by which solid waste materials are transformed into new products in such a manner that the original product may lose their identity, and which maybe used as raw materials for the production of other goods or services: *Provided*, That the collection, segregation and re-use of previously used packaging material shall be deemed recycling under this Act;
- cc. Resource conversation shall refer to the reduction of the amount of solid waste that are generated or the reduction of overall resource consumption, and utilization of recovered resources;
- dd. Resources recovery shall refer to the collection, extraction or recovery of recyclable materials from the waste stream for the purpose of recycling, generating energy or producing a product suitable for beneficial use: *Provided*, That such resource recovery facilities exclude incineration;
- ee. Re-use shall refer to the process of recovering materials intended for the same or different purpose without the alteration of physical and chemical characteristics;
- ff. Sanitary landfill shall refer to a waste disposal site designed, constructed, operated and maintained in a manner that exerts engineering control over significant potential environment impacts arising from the development and operation of the facility;
- gg. Schedule of Compliance shall refer to an enforceable sequence of actions or operations to be accomplished within a stipulated time frame leading to compliance with a limitation, prohibition or standard set forth in this Act or any rule of regulation issued pursuant thereto;
- hh. Secretary landfill shall refer to the Secretary of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources;


- ii. Segregation shall refer to a solid waste management practice of separating different materials found in solid waste in order to promote recycling and re-use of resources and to reduce the volume of waste for collection and disposal;
- jj. Segregation at source shall refer to a solid waste management practice of separating, at the point of origin, different materials found in solid waste in order to promote recycling and re-use of resources and to reduce the volume of waste for collection and disposal;
- kk. Solid waste shall refer to all discarded household, commercial waste, non-hazardous institutional and industrial waste, street sweepings, construction debris, agricultural waste, and other non-hazardous/non-toxic solid waste.


Unless specifically noted otherwise, the term "solid waste" as used in this Act shall not include:


1. Waste identified or listed as hazardous waste of a solid, liquid, contained gaseous or semisolid form which may cause or contribute to an increase in mortality or in serious or incapacitating reversible illness, or acute/chronic effect on the health of persons and other organisms;
 2. Infectious waste from hospitals such as equipment, instruments, utensils, and fomites of a disposable nature from patients who are suspected to have or have been diagnosed as having communicable diseases and must therefore be isolated as required by public health agencies, laboratory wastes such as pathological specimens (i.e. all tissues, specimens of blood elements, excreta, and secretions obtained from patients or laboratory animals) and disposable fomites that may harbor or transmit pathogenic organisms, and surgical operating room pathologic materials from outpatient areas and emergency rooms; and
 3. Waste resulting from mining activities, including contaminated soil and debris.
- ll. Solid waste management shall refer to the discipline associated with the control of generation, storage, collection, transfer and transport, processing, and disposal of solid wastes in a manner that is in accord with the best principles of public health, economics, engineering, conservation, aesthetics, and other environmental considerations, and that is also responsive to public attitudes;
 - mm. Solid waste management facility shall refer to any resource recovery system or component thereof; any system, program, or facility for resource conservation; any facility for the collection, source separation, storage, transportation, transfer, processing, treatment, or disposal of solid waste;
 - nn. Source reduction shall refer to the reduction of solid waste before it enters the solid waste stream by methods such as product design, materials substitution, materials re-use and packaging restrictions;
 - oo. Source separation shall refer to the sorting of solid waste into some or all of its component parts at the point of generation;
 - pp. Special wastes shall refer to household hazardous wastes such as paints, thinners, household batteries, lead-acid batteries, spray canisters and the like. These include wastes from residential and commercial sources that comprise of bulky wastes, consumer electronics, white goods, yard wastes that are collected separately, batteries, oil, and tires. These wastes are usually handled separately from other residential and commercial wastes;

- qq. Storage shall refer to the interim containment of solid wastes after generation and prior to collection for ultimate recovery or disposal;
 - rr. Transfer stations shall refer to those facilities utilized to receive solid wastes, temporarily store, separate, convert, or otherwise process the materials in the solid wastes, or to transfer the solid wastes directly from smaller to larger vehicles for transport. This term does not include any of the following:
 1. a facility whose principal function is to receive, store, separate, convert or otherwise process in accordance with national minimum standards, manure;
 2. a facility, whose principal function is to receive, store, convert, or otherwise process wastes which have already been separated for re-use and are intended for disposals, and
 3. the operations premises of a duly licensed solid waste handling operator who is receives, stores, transfers, or otherwise processes wastes as an activity incidental to the conduct of a refuse collection and disposal business.
 - ss. Waste diversion shall refer to activities which reduce or eliminate the amount of solid waste from waste disposal facilities;
 - tt. White goods shall refer to large worn-out or broken household, commercial, and industrial appliances such as stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, and clothes washers and dryers collected separately. White goods ate usually dismantled for the recovery of specific materials (e.g., copper, aluminum, etc.);
 - uu. Yard waste shall refer to wood, small or chipped branches, leaves, grass clippings, garden debris, vegetable residue that is recognized as part of a plant or vegetable and other materials identified by the Commission.
 - vv. Proposed Land Used - the proposed land use plan will guide the physical development of Malolos, Bulacan. This plan is formulated along the development trust as contained in the Philippines 2000 that gives emphasis on urbanization and industrialization. The proximity of Malolos, Bulacan to the highly urbanized cities and municipalities makes it a potential catchment area for commercial and industrial investors. With this foreseen development trend changes in City is inevitable. It is within this premise that this plan in identified specific areas for each land uses, line residential, commercial and industrial open space, etc. Based on Section 20 of the Local Government Code of 1991 which pertains to the re-classification of lands, the City of Malolos is a first class city and is allowed to re-classify its land up to 15% of its to agricultural.
 - ww. Buffer Zones - are identified areas outside the boundaries of and immediately adjacent to designated protected areas and need special development continue to avoid or minimize harm to the protected area.
 - xx. Farm Lands - Lands intended for or actually devoted to production of food, including plantations, except fishpond and other adjoining bodies of water.
 - yy. Industrial Lands - Public lands within zones established by city for the manufacturer and production of large quantities of goods and commodities.

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
- a. **Aquatic Pollution** - the introduction by men or machine in the grounds on water, marine or fresh water, of substances on energy which results on is likely to result in such delirious effects as to harm living and non-living aquatic resources, posing hazard to human health.
- b. **Aquatic Resources** - living resources of aquatic environment including fishes, aquatic flora and fauna and mangroves.
- c. **Artificial Reefs** - a collection of solid structures placed together in aquatic environment to provide for improve fish habitat. They can be made from used tires, bamboos, concrete, old cars, boots or ships or other solid structure that will be stable when submerged in the sea. They serve as sanctuaries and shelters, which increase the survival of juvenile fishes and foster reproduction. Attractors for aquarium fishes, city ground or recreational areas for diving and deterrent of trawl fishing.
- d. **Coastal Zone** - the strip of land and ocean space (water and submerged land) and which the land ecology and land use affect and ocean space ecology. The inner most boundary from the shoreline except at places where recognizable indicator for massive influence exist like mangroves, nipa, beach vegetation sandiness, saltbeds, marshland, resort marine deposit, black and sand deposit in which case the 1 km. Distance shall be reckoned form the ages of such features.
- e. **Fish Corrals or Baklad** - a stationary wire as strap device to intercept and capture fish consisting of rows of bamboos with plastic netting and other materials fenced with split bamboos matting or wire matting with one or more enclosure.
- f. **Fishery** - all activities relating to the act or business of gathering, taking, culturing, processing and marketing of fish and other aquatic products.
- g. **Illegal Fishing Methods** - refers to fishing with the use of germs that cause damage to ecological processes to habitats or cause a needless depletion of fish stocks directly or indirectly. Included are fishing with the use of dynamite, other explosive or chemical composed that contains combustible elements that upon ignition by friction, concussion, percussion or detraction, of all parts of the compound. It also refers to the use of any other devices that causes and explosion that is capable of producing harmful effects.
- h. **Mangroves** - a community of plants including all species of trees, shrubs, vines and herbs found along the sea, coasts, swamps or border of swamps, extending along where the water is brackish consisting of a community of plants.
- i. **Marginal Fisherman** - refer to fisherman whose daily catch is barely enough to sustain their daily needs.
- j. **Marine Reserve** - a defined space in the coastal zone where specified forms of management are applied and which normally include limited entry.
- k. **Municipal Waters** - include stream, rivers, creeks, submarine and tidal water within the territorial jurisdiction of a city that are not subject to private ownership and not included within national park, urban faces, fishery reserve and cover marine water, 15 kilometers from shoreline (RA 8550 fishing land).

SECTION 18. - DEFINITION: AS USED IN AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT.


- a. **Air Pollutant** - any matter found in the atmosphere other than oxygen, nitrogen, water vapor, carbon dioxide, and inert gasses in their nature or normal concentrations and includes smoke, dust soot, inders, fly ash, solid particles of any kind, gasses, fumes, mists, odors, radioactive substances and other substance.
- b. **Air Pollution** - occurs when harmful substances including particulates and biological molecules are introduced into Earth's atmosphere. It may cause diseases, allergies or death of humans; it may also cause harm to other living organisms such as animals and food crops, and may damage the natural or built environment.

- c. **Airborne Dusk or Dust** - Minute solid particles released into or carried into the atmosphere by natural forces or by any fuel burning combustion, or process equipment of device, by construction works, or by mechanical or industrial process.
 - d. **Ambient Air Quality** - The average atmospheric purity as distinguished from discharge measurement taken at the service of pollution.
 - e. **Emission** - The act of passing the atmospheric and air contaminant, pollutant gas stream and unwanted sound from a known source.
 - f. **Fuel-Burning Equipment** - Any equipment device on contrivance and all appurtenances, thereto including ducts, breaching, fish feeding equipment, ash removed equipment controls, stacks and chimneys, used primarily, but not exclusively to burn any fuel for the purpose of direct application or indirect heating such as the production of air and hot water.
 - g. **Greenhouse Effect** - A warming near the earth's surface that results when the earth's atmosphere traps the sun's heat. The greenhouse effect receives its name because the earth's atmosphere acts much like the glass of plastic roof and walls of a greenhouse. The earth's atmosphere allows most of the sunlight that reaches it to pass through and heat the earth's surface. The earth's sends the heat energy back into the atmosphere as the infra-red radiation. Much of this radiation does not passed freely into the space because certain gasses in the atmosphere absorbed in. These gasses include carbon dioxide, ozone and water vapor. They glow warm and infra-red radiation back toward the earth, adding to the warming of the surface.
 - h. **Smoke** - Gas borne particularly resulting incomplete conduction, consisting predominantly but not exclusively of carbon, ashes or other combustion materials.
 - i. **Standard as Limit** - The concentration of any air contaminant which in order to protect the public health and welfare shall not be exceeded at a particular region or zone, and not a specified period of fine standards are enforceable and must be complied with by the owner or person in charge of an industrial operation, process or trade.


Technical Terms

For the purpose of clarity and in furtherance of the import and purposes of this Code, the following terms are defined as follows:


- a. **Existing Irrigation System** - those structures and facilities that were constructed to provide water needs of farms for agricultural production whether national, communal or privately managed which cater to an association or group or cooperative.
- b. **National Irrigation Systems** - are those that are constructed and maintained by the NIA and correspondingly collect service fee (ISF) from beneficiaries.
- c. **Communal Irrigation Systems** - are those constructed by NIA whose operation and maintenance is being turned over to the Irrigators Association (IA). IA pays annual amortization with a minimum of 1.5 cavans per hectares until the cost of project is paid. Correspondingly, NIA extend technical assistance to these Irrigators Association.
- d. **Privately Managed Irrigation Systems** - are those established by the defunct FSDC or those established by cooperatives which cater to the water needs of farm members of associations or cooperative.
- e. **Turnout** - a structure built at a point where farm ditched branches out from a canal, a regulate/control water flow into the paddies. This structure is provided with steel gates.
- f. **Check Structure** - built to maintain water surface elevation required for delivery. This structure is also provided with steel gate.
- g. **Steel Gate** - to regulate the flow into a structure.
- h. **Head Gate** - structure built and provided with steel gates to regulate or control water flow into a canal.
- i. **Dike** - a mound of earth or stone defending lowlands from flooding by sea or river.



SECTION 23. - CITY TRAINING AND LIAISON OFFICE - There is hereby organized under the Human Resource Management Office a City Training and Liaison Board (CTLB) to plan and implement training intervention for the promotion of environment protection and optimal participation of the citizenry thereon. It will also perform the liaison work with government and non-government entities related to training on environment conducted locally and abroad.

SECTION 24. - INCENTIVE AWARDS BOARD - There is hereby created an Incentive Awards Board (IAB) in the Office of the Mayor to formulate the criteria and mode of giving incentives and awards to persons contributing innovative approaches or with outstanding performances in the protection of the environment. Representatives from the private sector, local legislative body, academe, clergy, business and industrial sector shall be named by the City Mayor to constitute the Board.

The Board shall formulate incentive program for idle land owners that will join the greening program of the City.

SECTION 25. - LOCAL WATER BOARD - There shall be created a Local Water Board in the Office of the Mayor to specifically undertake the function and responsibility of maintaining the water management system as a coordinating and cooperating unit with the Malolos Water District. There shall be set standards which will be used for all water consumption and forecast using the set standard. It shall be the policy that potable water shall have priority over industrial water. There shall also be instituted measures on the control of water extraction.

SECTION 26. - INTER-BARANGAY ALLIANCE - Cooperative undertakings among barangays for the optimal implementation of this Code where barangays and their inhabitants are concerned and after conducting a public hearing may enter into Memoranda of Agreement by committing personnel, funds and other resources for the common good in support to environment initiatives which shall be incorporated in the Barangay Annual Development Plan and Appropriation Budget. The Liga ng mga Barangay shall initiate and implement this concept of cooperative undertakings among barangays.

**CHAPTER V
AIR AND NOISE MANAGEMENT**

SECTION 27. - POLICY STATEMENT - The basic intention of the City of Malolos is to undertake the necessary precautionary and preventive measures to ensure the maintenance of ambient air quality. Given the complexity of clean air management and the insufficient technology and resources available for the conduct of atmosphere monitoring and evaluation, the City of Malolos shall prevent to the greatest extent permissible, the continued degradation of air quality within its territorial jurisdiction based on available resources, information and technical support to achieve such level of a standard quality of air as prescribed by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR).



SECTION 28. - MANAGEMENT DIRECTION AND RATIONALE


- a. The air we breathe directly dictates humankind's ability to lead healthy and productive lives. Over the last decade, the burdens on the quality of air brought about by mass production and mass consumption amidst a growing population have increasingly led to its deterioration. Consequently, the atmosphere has been considered to be the most unstable. This is due in part to the long persistence of contaminants that are absorbed within it, the constant advection processes that are occurring in ordinary, daily human activities and the slow process of natural renewal and cleansing that are characteristic of the atmosphere.
- b. The prospect of global warming conveys a sense of impending economic calamity that can affect not only on human health, but food supplies as well. Researchers predict that by the next century,, the "green house effect", caused by a possible doubling of atmospheric carbon dioxide, would warm the Earth from 3 to 9 degrees centigrade. The pollution of the air largely due to vehicle and industrial emissions has become an environmental and health issue of urgent significance.
- c. Local anti-air pollution laws are established in several legislations, PD 1152 of the Philippine Environment Code as well as the Pollution Decree of 1976 (PD 984) has provided for the setting up of ambient air quality standards and directs the management policy of the Philippine atmosphere on a holistic perspective. PD 1181 provides for the prevention, control and abatement of air pollution from motor vehicles. And lately, the Clean Air Act established the integrative mechanism to control air pollution, pertinent provisions of which are hereby adopted as part hereof.
- d. The maximum emission limits for particulate in stationary sources, the National Emission Standards for source Specific air Pollution (NESSAP), the National Ambient air Quality Guideline for Criteria Pollutants and the National Ambient Air Quality Standards fro source Specific Pollutants from industrial sources/operations have all been established under DENR administrative Order No. 14, Series of 1993 are hereby adopted for local emission standards.
- e. Pursuant to the powers, and those expressly implied, it shall be the long term objective of the Sangguniang Panlungsod and the Local Chief Executive to work for the attainment of the atmospheric standards prescribed in A.O. 14 to this end, the City Government shall allocate funds of the acquisition of proper equipment, training of personnel and the development and enforcement of monitoring systems and network for the maintenance of the ambient air quality.
- f. Ambient Air Quality Control - The (DENR) shall conduct an annual inspection of all industrial facilities, including all equipment emitting potential air pollutants, to ensure that such establishments are complying with the prescribed standards on air quality.
- g. Reducing Emission of Carbon Dioxide (CO2) and other Greenhouse Gases - The City of Malolos shall exert major effort to contribute towards the minimization of global warming, the City Government shall regulate the use of chemical fertilizer, burning of timber and craft residues and burning of fossils fuels within its territorial limits.

SECTION 29. - INDUSTRIAL AIR POLLUTION - The levels of air quality for suspended particulates, sulfur dioxide, photochemical oxidants or ozone and carbon monoxide and the indices to compare whether such atmosphere parameters are within acceptable levels have been established by the DENR (A.O. No. 14) for all areas. It shall be the duty of the City Government to ensure the compliance to these standards by:



- b. Requiring all holders of business permit using fossil fuel in any part their business operation to submit environment clearance certificate issued to them by the DENR-EMB as a pre-requisite to the renewal of their business permits;
- c. Inform all establishments of the City's policy of adhering the air quality standards;
- d. In compliance to the ambient air quality standard ser above, the CEPO/Task Force on Enforcement shall enforce or implement the environmental inspection, control and banning as may be appropriated, the erection, the use, installation or operation of any article, machinery, to any contrivance which would release air pollutants into the atmosphere which together with the concentrations of existing air pollutants in the City, would result to ambient air concentration greater that the quality standards set.

SECTION 30. - VEHICULAR AIR POLLUTION - It shall be the policy of the City Government to ensure that precautions are undertaken to prevent the emission of excessive carbon monoxide, particulates and sulfur dioxide from motor vehicles. The enforcement of the Anti-Smoke Belching Ordinance, the intensification of coordination among concerned agencies on the use of unleaded gasoline and reduced sulfur dioxide content of diesel fuel, the establishment of a traffic mitigation program to ensure the smooth flow of vehicles and the promotion of mass transport system shall be both an operational and educational activity of CEPO and the Training and Liaison Office. This will be treated in the Traffic Code.

SECTION 31. - PERMIT TO OPERATE BUSINESSES - No business permit shall be issued by the City Government unless all the necessary requirements related to environmental protection as stated and situated in this Code are complied with.

SECTION 32. - AIR POLLUTION MEASURING DEVICES INSTALLATION - There shall be a feasibility study for the installation of air pollution measuring devices like smoke emission meter reader to regulate emission of all vehicle, six months upon the effectivity of this Code.

SECTION 33. - ESTABLISHMENT OF CENTER FOR TREATMENT OF AIR POLLUTION-RELATED DISEASES - There shall be a feasibility study for the establishment of a center that will treat air pollution-related diseases within six months upon the effectivity of this Code.


SECTION 34. - SMOKE BELCHING - It shall be the policy of the City Government to strictly enforce its Anti-smoke Belching Program to prevent the excessive emission of pollutive particles from motor vehicles and to ensure that the citizens enjoy clean air.

SECTION 35. - SEWAGE DISPOSAL - No sewerage dangerous to the public health safety and general welfare shall be discharge into any public sewerage system, natural water, river and drainage channel, the water receiving standard set by the National Pollution Commission shall be complied with by the manufacturing industries.

SECTION 36. - NOISE REGULATION:

36.1 The City Government shall regulate the noise and barriers especially in the Hospital Zone, School/Institution and Churches for public health and safety, to be imposed on motor vehicles (eg. Cars, jeepneys, motorcycles, and other public utilities).

36.2 **NOISE AT NIGHT OR ON A GENERAL HOLIDAY**- Noise from Residential Premises and Public Places. (Section 3, City Ordinance No. 51-2017)





36.2.1 Any person who between the hours of 10:00 p.m and 6:00 a.m or at any time on a general holiday in any residential premises or public places makes or causes to be made any noise exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards and source of annoyance to any person commits a violation to this ordinance.

36.2.2 Any person being the owner, tenant, occupier or person in charge of any residential premises who between the hours of 10:00 p.m and 6:00 am, or at any time on a general holiday knowingly permits or suffers noise exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards and as source of annoyance to any person to emanate from those domestic premises commits a violation to this ordinance.

36.3 **NOISE AT ANY TIME** - The following conditions sited below violates this ordinance: (Section 4, ibid)

1. Any person/persons who at any time in any residential premises or public place exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards as regulated in section 15 of this ordinance, who is:

- a. playing or operating any musical or other instruments, including any record or audio player and using of any loud-speaker, megaphone, karaokes, videoke machines or other devices for magnifying sound exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards and will not be allowed to play beyond the normally accepted modulation between 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM as per City Ordinance No. 43-2006 (shall be penalized under City Ordinance No. 43-2006);
- b. plays any game or engages in any pastime or plays a radio or television apparatus exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards; or
- c. carries on a trade or business, the noise of which exceeds the maximum allowable noise quality standards is a source of annoyance to any person.

2. Any person/persons who at any time in any residential premises operates, or causes or permits to be operated, any air-conditioning or ventilating system or part thereof, the noise of which is exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards regulated by this ordinance and source annoyance to any person.


3. Any person/persons who at any time in any residential premises or public place keeps any animal or bird that makes any noise exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards and a source of annoyance to any person.




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1. Any person/persons who at any place between the hours of 7 p.m. and 8 a.m., or at any time on a general holiday, uses, or causes, any powered mechanical equipment for the purpose of carrying out any construction work other than percussive piling -
 - a. in respect of which a construction noise notice is not in force; or
 - b. otherwise than in accordance with the conditions of a construction noise notice/guidelines in force in respect thereof, violates the ordinance.
 2. The owner, tenant or occupier of residential premises may perform construction work in those premises without a construction noise permit being in force in respect thereof provided that-
 - a. the construction work is performed only by the owner, tenant or occupier, as the case may be;
 - b. the only powered mechanical equipment used for the construction work is portable and designed for operation while held by hand without any other form of support; and
 - c. only one item of powered mechanical equipment is in use in the premises at any one time.


1. City Engineering Office (CEO) in coordination with the City Health Office (CHO) and the City Environment and Natural Resources Division (CENRD) may issue construction noise notice/guidelines upon application and may impose guidelines in relation to any construction within the City of Malolos.
2. Not later than 15 days after an application made under this section is received by the CEO, they shall issue a construction noise notice/guidelines and if at the end of those 15 days he has done neither of those things the CEO shall have the power to stop on-going construction.
3. Upon issuance of a construction noise notice/guidelines, this written notice of the decision will be serve on the applicant and in the case of a subject to conditions issued in respect of percussive piling, shall adequately state in the notice the reasons for the imposition of those conditions.
4. A construction noise notice/guidelines -
 - a. shall be in the prescribed form;
 - b. shall be in force for such period as shall be specified therein; and
5. The CEO, CHO and CENRD may amend or vary the conditions of a construction noise notice/guidelines that have been issued or impose new conditions in relation to a construction noise if they are satisfied that -
 - a. a condition of the construction noise notice/guidelines has been contravened;
 - b. the construction noise notice/guidelines was issued in consequence of misleading, false, wrong or incomplete information furnished by the applicant in connection with the application; or
 - c. except where the construction noise notice/guidelines is in respect of any percussive piling, the public interest so requires.
6. When CEO, CHO and CENRD stops a construction or imposes new conditions in relation to a construction noise, they shall give written notice of the decision to the person or company and shall adequately state in the notice the reasons for stopping the activity or giving variation of conditions, or the imposition of new conditions, as the case may be.
7. Conditions that the CEO may impose in relation to a construction noise notice/guidelines -



- b. maximum noise levels that shall not be exceeded at any specified location at any specified time;
- c. any specified powered mechanical equipment may be used; and
- d. limitations relating to the time when any specified construction work may be carried out.

36.7 TECHNICAL MEMORANDA RELATING TO NOISE EMANATING FROM CONSTRUCTION SITES.
(Section 8, Ibid) -

The Construction Noise Notice/Guidelines shall include a Technical Memoranda setting out principles, procedures, guidelines, standards and limits for -

- a. the prediction, measurement and assessment of noise emanating from a construction site;
- b. the issuing of construction noise notice;
- c. the imposition and variation of conditions in relation to construction noise notice;
- d. the determination of whether or not the conditions of a construction noise notice/guidelines are being complied with.

36.8 TECHNICAL MEMORANDA/NOTICE RELATING TO NOISE EMANATING FROM DOMESTIC OR RESIDENTIAL PREMISES, PUBLIC PLACES AND OTHER PLACES (Section 9, Ibid)

- 1. A Technical Memoranda/notice can be issue setting out principles, procedures, guidelines, standards and limits for -
 - a. measurement and assessment of noise emanating from any than domestic or residential premises, public places and other places;
 - b. the issuing of noise abatement notices in respect of such noise;
 - c. the determination of whether or not a noise abatement notice is being complied with.
- 2. CEO, CHO and CENRD shall be guided by the maximum allowable noise quality standards under this ordinance when undertaking any measurement or assessment to determine if a noise abatement notice should be served.

36.9 NOISE ABATEMENT NOTICES (Section 10, Ibid)

- 1. When CEO, CHO and CENRD is satisfied that noise is emanating from any place other than domestic or residential premises, public place or other places and that such noise, whether on its own or together with noise emanating from any other place other than domestic premises, a public place or a construction site -
 - a. is a source of annoyance to any person (other than a person in the place from which the noise is emanating) in any place considered to be a noise sensitive receiver in any Technical Memorandum/notices issued;
 - b. does not comply with any standard or limit prescribed for the purposes of this section; or
 - c. does not comply with any standard or limit contained in Technical Memoranda/notice issued, the CEO, CHO and CENRD may serve a noise abatement notice in the prescribed form on any or all of the following:
 - i. the person making the noise or causing or permitting the noise to be made; or
 - ii. the owner, tenant, occupier or person in charge of the place from which the noise is emanating.






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2. A noise abatement notice served under sub-section (1) relating to noise emanating from any place may require the person on whom it is served to abate the noise within the period specified therein and to do all things as may be necessary for that purpose, and may require the person on whom it is served to -
 - a. ensure that the noise emanating from such place does not exceed any limit or standard specified in the notice;
 - b. where the noise is emanating from such place by reason of the operation of any plant, machinery, vehicle, equipment or process, ensure that any such plant, machinery, vehicle, equipment or process is operated in accordance with any condition specified in the notice; and
 - c. notify the CEO, CHO and CENRD in writing within the period specified in the notice that any requirement/s specified in the notice has been complied with.
 3. In specifying a period under subsection (2) within which noise is to be abated, the CEO, CHO and CENRD shall have regard to the nature, difficulty and complexity of complying with any requirement in the noise abatement notice.
 4. The CEO, CHO and CENRD may, by notice in the prescribed form served on any person on whom a noise abatement notice has been served under subsection (1), cancel the noise abatement notice or vary any requirement therein.
 5. A noise abatement notice served under subsection (1) or any notice served under subsection (4) varying a requirement in a noise abatement notice shall not take effect until a date specified in any such notice, being a date not less than 15 days after the day on which the notice is served.
 6. Any person who, having been served with a noise abatement notice under subsection (1) or a notice under subsection (4), fails to comply with any requirement therein commits an offense.
 7. Any person who commits an offense under subsection (6) shall be liable -
 - a. on first conviction to a fine of ₱1,000.00;
 - b. on second or subsequent conviction, to a fine of ₱3,000.00;
 - c. on third offense a fine of ₱5,000.00;and in any case to a fine of ₱5,000.00 for each day during which the offense continues.
 8. Any person who, having been required to notify the CEO, CHO and CENRD in writing under subsection (2)(c) that any requirement has been complied with, makes or furnishes any statement in so notifying the offices which to his knowledge is misleading or false in a material particular, commits an offense and is liable to a fine of ₱5,000.00.
- 36.10 INTRUDER ALARM SYSTEM INSTALLED IN ANY VEHICLE (Section 11, Ibid)**
1. Every registered owner of a vehicle who has an intruder alarm system installed in, on or under that vehicle shall ensure that the intruder alarm system is provided with an efficient automatic device which -
 - a. shall not emit any audible signal caused otherwise than by an act of direct physical contact with the vehicle, whether that act is intentional or unintentional; and
 - b. shall cause any audible signal to cease not more that 5 minutes after the activation of the signal.
 2. Any person who fails to comply with subsection (1) commits an offense and is liable setup by the following:
 - a. A written notice will be served at First offense;
 - b. Second offense and next offenses shall have a fine of ₱1,000.00.



36.11 **POWERS OF ENTRY AND INSPECTION, ETC.** (Section 12, Ibid)


1. Subject to subsection (2), an authorized officer by CEO, CHO and CENRD may, if so required, of his written authorization -
 - a. enter and search any place if he reasonably believes that -
 - i. an offense against this Ordinance has been or is being committed in any such place;
 - ii. there is in any such place anything that is or is likely to constitute evidence that an offense against this Ordinance has been or is being committed;
 - b. enter any place for the purpose of exercising any power under this Ordinance or of serving any notice;
 - c. carry out any measurement, inspection or test as he reasonably believes is necessary in order to determine if an offense against this Ordinance has been or is being committed;
 - d. observe and monitor any measurement, inspection or test on any product required to be carried out;
 - e. do all that is reasonably necessary to determine whether or not any notice should be served under section 11(1), and 11(4).
2. An authorized officer who enters any place under subsection (1), may require any person present at that place -
 - a. to give details of his identity, name and address for inspection by the authorized officer; or
 - b. who appears at the time to be responsible for or in charge of that place, to give such information or render such assistance as may be necessary to enable the authorized officer to carry out his functions under this part.

36.12 **PROHIBITIONS AGAINST POWER HORNS, PUBLIC ADDRESS, LOUD SPEAKERS ON VEHICLES AND LOUD MOTORCYCLE MUFFLERS** (Section 13, Ibid)


1. It shall be unlawful to operate and used indiscriminately through the emission of exceptionally-loud, startling, or disagreeable sound, and powerful music on all types of motor vehicles exceeding maximum allowable noise quality standards, both private and public including buses, jeepneys, taxis, FX, tricycles, motorcycles, pedicabs, and the like while plying the thoroughfares and streets of the City of Malolos.
2. Provided, that a public address and speaker system utilized in open public places employing loud noise during public gatherings or similar activities shall be covered by a proper certification issued by the City Government of Malolos.
3. Motors and tricycles operating with substandard muffler system emitting loud, excessive, disturbing and unhealthful sound exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards plying the streets of City of Malolos shall be apprehended.
4. Any person who fails to comply with subsection (1,2,3) commits an offense and is liable setup by the following:
 - a. First Offense - Confiscation of License and penalty of ₱1,000.00.
 - b. Second Offense - Confiscation of License and penalty of ₱2,000.00.
 - c. Third Offense - Confiscation of License and penalty of ₱3,000/or imprisonment for a period of six (6) months but not exceeding one (1) year at the discretion of the court.
 - d. All violations under Section 14 (3) shall be penalize in accordance with *Kautusang Panlungsod Blg. 24-2006.*




36.14- **PENALTIES** (Section 16, Ibid)


- Penalties are stated regarding each violation in every section.
- For Section 4,5 and 7:
- Any person or persons, owner or owners, business entities or corporation found violating any provisions of this ordinance, shall be penalized with a fine of ONE THOUSAND PESOS (₱1,000.00) but not exceeding FIVE THOUSAND PESOS (₱5,000.00) and/or imprisonment for a period of six (6) months but not exceeding one (1) year at the discretion of the court;
- All violations under Section 14 (3) or violations in using substandard muffler system emitting loud, excessive, disturbing and unhealthful sound exceeding the maximum allowable noise quality standards shall be penalize in accordance with *Kautusang Panlungsod Blg. 24-2006*.
- The president or manager in case of a company, corporation, association, or partnership, or the owner/proprietor or operator in case of a single proprietorship shall be liable to the above-mentioned penalties.



SECTION 40. - ODOR AND GASES - The emission of foul odors gasses detrimental to public health safety and general shall not be permitted. Building and activity emitting foul odor and obnoxious gasses shall be enclose by airtight building provided with air conditioning system, filters deodorizing and other cleansing materials and equipments.

SECTION 41. - INDUSTRIAL WASTE - Industrial/plant waste shall be disposed of only a manner which will not create any nuisance or danger to adjoining properties, waterways or to the community in general.

SECTION 42. - PROHIBITED ACTS

A. Fugitive Particulates

No person shall cause, let, permit, suffer or allow the emission of particulate matter from any source whatsoever, including but not limited to vehicular movement, transportation of materials, construction, alteration, demolition or wrecking or industry related activities such as loading, storing or "handling" without taking reasonable precaution to prevent such emission. Such reasonable precautions shall include, but not limited to the following:

1. Use, where possible, of water or chemicals for control of dust in the demolition of existing buildings or structure; construction or operation of the grinding of rock, and quarrying or clearing of lands.
2. Application of asphalt, oil water, or suitable chemicals on roads. Materials stockpiles, and other surface which create airborne dust problem; and
3. Installation and use of hood fans and fabric filters or other suitable control devices to enclose and vent the handling of dusty materials. Adequate containment methods shall be employed during sandblasting or other similar operations.

B. Volatile Organic Compounds or Organic Solvent Emissions

No person shall store, pump, handles, process, unload or use any process or installation, volatile compound or organic solvents without applying known existing vapor emission control devices or systems deemed necessary and approved by the National Pollution Control Emission.

C. Nuisance


No person shall discharge from any source whatsoever such quantities of air contaminants or other materials which constitute nuisance.

D. Open Burning

No person shall be allowed to burn any materials in any quantity which shall cause the emission of toxic and poisonous fumes. Such materials include but are not limited to plastic, polyvinyl chloride, paints, ink, wastes containing heavy metals, organic chemicals, petroleum related compound, industrial wastes, ozone depleting substances and other similar toxic and hazard substances.

Further, no establishments, firm, company, government or private entity or organizations shall be allowed to burn or cause open burning waste materials in their premises, area of jurisdiction, including recognized or unrecognized dumpsites in any quality or quantity.

1. No person shall place, store or hold any stationary tank, reservoir, or other container of more than 150,000 liters capacity of any volatile organic compounds unless such tank, reservoir or other container is pressure efficient, under normal conditions to prevent vapor or gas loss leakage to the atmosphere, or is designed and equipped with adequate vapor loss control devices.
 2. No person shall use or sell aerosols and other products with Chloro Floro Carbon (CFC), halogen and other chemicals that cause the depletion of the ozone layer to protect people, plants and marine life from its harmful effect.
 3. No person shall ignite, cause to be ignited, or maintain open fires except in the following activities:
 - a. Open fires for food and human consumption;
 - b. Fires for recreational or ceremonial purposes;
 - c. Fires to the prevention and control of diseases and pests;
 - d. Fires for the disposal of dangerous materials or waste, when there is no practical alternative method for disposal, provided that a clearance is secured from the Mayor's Office;
 - e. Fires for training personnel in the methods of fighting fires;
 - f. Fires purposely set for recognized forest and wildlife management practices; and
 - g. Open fires expressly approved by the local government.
 4. No person shall cause excessive noise and vibration fro both mobile and stationary devices such as vehicles, construction and digging equipment, stationary engines, factories, pub houses, restaurants, karaokes and amusement parks.
 5. No person shall discharge or dispose foul-smelling materials/substances in violation of good sanitation and hygiene and if the foul smell is indeed emitted, the City Government of Malolos shall require the source of pollution to adopt measure that will mitigate odors pollution, including dilution by ventilation as dispersal, combustion or oxidation, neutralization or odor masking.
 6. All smoke belching vehicles which emit polluted material/substance plying the streets within the City Government, shall be apprehended and fined accordingly in accordance with the Revenue Code Of Malolos.
 7. Improper disposal of untreated toxic chemicals and hazardous waste materials.

**CHAPTER VI
WATER RESOURCE MANAGEMENT**

SECTION 43. - POLICY STATEMENT OF WATER UTILIZATION - In line with the provision of the constitution as embodied in the water code of the Philippines, all waters belong to the state. The ownership of water by the states means that water cannot be subject to acquisitive prescription: however the state may allow the use and development of water by administrative concession. The City Government through the local water utility administration, exercise control and regulation of the water work utility administrations pertaining to it's utilization, exploitation, development conversation and protection. In the observance of the above-mentioned principle the City of Malolos shall ensure equitable appropriation of water resources to its constituents consistent with the order of preference adopted by the state.

SECTION 44. - BASIS FOR ACTION - Water is essential to life on earth and the survival of human species. They have wide range of uses that need to optimize and balance for the benefit of the present and future generation as well. With increasing population and intensification of economic activities the rate of use has overtakes the rate of replenishment to a point where the basic needs are no longer satisfied.

SECTION 45. - WATER RESOURCES - With the fast growing population and expansion of economic activities the need for water has been increasing at a past rate which has brought an imbalance between supplies and demand of portable and usable water. In order to provide and secure water supply for the current and future generation living within its jurisdiction is imperative. That the City of Malolos should:

1. Take the responsibility in identifying existing potential water sources for domestic and individual use and ensure that the source of water can satisfy the needs of its inhabitants in the present and future generations. A complete inventory of creeks, spring sources along with subsurface acquire system. Databases shall be established for these H2O sources with adequate information as quantity and quality. Interim plans should be established on law. These water sources could be tapped accessed and developed.
2. Data inventory the water resources and include this characteristics, location and types shall be maintaining and up-dated by the members for the future reference.
3. It shall determine the contaminated water sources such as the salt-water intruded areas and chemical contaminated areas as part of the environmentally affected areas.
4. It shall establish its non-water budget on a periodic basis to determine its water needs and potentials.


SECTION 46. - INVENTORY AND CLASSIFICATION OF WATER RESOURCES - It is hereby mandated that an inventory and classification of water resources within its territories be made, which shall be the basis for the issuance of water utilization permits or licenses. The inventory shall cover all bodies of water, including surface and underground water, flowing continuously or intermittently over lands.





SECTION 47. - WATER SUPPLY QUALITY - The health of the populace is of primary concern. The quality drinking water has a direct impact on the health of the people. For the maintenance of health and well being of the people adequate supply of water with acceptable quality should be made available.


1. It shall be the responsibility of the City Government. The LWUA to ensure that the quality of H2O shall be within the permits of the National Standard for drinking H2O.
2. Water for direct consumption shall confirm to acceptable requirement of bacteriological quality.
3. Remedial measures should be instituted at once to correct any defect of system damage to prevent non qualified H2O to enter the supplies system.
4. Distribution system should be given priority attention since poor distribution is the prime cause of H2O contamination.
5. It shall come up with a program of monitoring waste H2O in the community.
6. The City shall come up with the monitoring program for fugitive effluent and require business operators to submit measures in the event of accidental release of chemicals.



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SECTION 48. - WATER UTILIZATION - Potable water shall have the priority over industrial water. Any person operating purifying station for commercial purposes shall submit samples for monthly testing according to BFAD standards. Any person extracting water for commercial purposes shall pay the corresponding fee in accordance with the City Revenue Code.

SECTION 49. - WATERWAYS CONSERVATION, PROTECTION, MAINTENANCE AND RETRIEVAL

49.1 In coordination with the DENR, the City Government shall determine the present state and quality of water resources under its jurisdiction in order to formulate a water quality management scheme and determine the types and point sources of pollutants, and the allowable volume of effluents that can be permitted into waterways, subject to standards set by the DENR. The City shall establish a water treatment and other sewerage system in coordination with the DENR, LWUA and other government agency.

49.2 **CITY WATERWAYS DAY.** It is hereby designated the 3rd Friday of every June of each year as the City Waterways Day.

Alongside with the celebration is the conduct of the Semi-Annual CLEAN UP DRIVE in every barangay in cooperation and participation of all barangay officials, stakeholders and volunteers.

The event and the conduct of the Clean Up Drive shall be under the auspices of the City Mayor through the City General Services Officer and the City Administrator. (Section 4, City Ordinance No. 02-2018).

49.3 **CITY CLEAN UP DRIVE.** It is mandated that all Sangguniang Barangay shall conduct their respective Clean Up Drive at least once every month.


All establishments, schools whether public or private and other entities that exist along a certain river, creek, waterways and within the coastal areas shall participate in the conduct of the clean up drive and shall follow the provisions of the Water Code of the Philippines and other pertinent laws and ordinances; (Section 5, City Ordinance No. 02-2018)


SECTION 50. - WATER PRESERVATION - All waterways usurped/encroached by private sector shall be returned accordingly within three years from the effectivity of this Code.

SECTION 51. - PROHIBITED ACTS - The following are prohibited acts:


- a. Extraction of underground water without necessary permits;
- b. Fishing on public waterways by poisoning, dynamite, electrocution;
- c. Dumping waste into waterways
- d. Construction of structure within the easement portion of any waterways;
- e. Impounding of water that prejudiced other persons;
- f. Construction of local dumpsites of industrial settlement pits and waste treatment plants less that one kilometer away from the source of potable water supply of the community;
- g. Construction/development of a stream, lake marshland or pond for recreational or commercial purposes without first securing a permit from the City Government;
- h. Construction or setting up of any structure, temporary or otherwise, that would destroy the historical and scenic value of natural waterways;
- i. Liquid waste into waterways beyond the tolerable limit set by DENR standards.

SECTION 52. - ILLEGAL CONSTRUCTION ALONG WATERWAYS - No person is allowed to construct any structure, building or improvement within 3 meters in the city proper and 20 meters in agricultural areas from the creek sides, river banks and similar waterways. Any person or business establishment who shall be caught violations the provision of this ordinance shall be fined the amount of P5,000.00.





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**CHAPTER VII
COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT**

SECTION 53. - POLICY STATEMENT

- a. It is a declared policy of the City that coastal zone including its territorial water in its resources shall be for the professional use of its citizen's subject the limits of optimism sustainability.
- b. It shall adopt a policy to improve the living condition of coastal population specifically in areas of sanitation and waste disposal in order to reduce proliferations of pathogenic organism in the coastal environment from the domestic wastewater.
- c. It shall adopt a preventive and precautionary policy against industrial population of the coastal zone through the adoption of all relevant law against industrial waste and efficient discharges.

SECTION 54. - STATE OF RESOURCES - The resource includes rivers, streams, creeks, distributory tidal at reams irrigation canals and drainage waterways develop and crisscross. There are several patches of low depressions with carrying areas and are very prominent on the southern of the area of both sides of the Manila North Road and zonal in the interior barangays of Bulihan, Anilao, Canalate, Matimbo & Pamarawan.

- 1. Cause the measurement and delineation of its territorial water and facilitate the production of the necessary resource maps.
- 2. Recommend to the Sangguniang Panlungsod to pass an ordinance declaring the city coastal jurisdiction.
- 3. Promote community participation in the management of coastal and aquatic resources as the central theme of resource management plans developed by the city water resources.

SECTION 55. - PREVENTIVE MEASURES AGAINST MARINE HEALTH HAZARDS - It shall adopt a policy regarding preventive measure against marine health hazard. It should be the primary responsibility of the city treasurer that the coastal water remains wholesome for its various uses including the recreational and food supply purpose.

SECTION 56. - ORGANIZATION OF CITY FISHERIES & AQUATIC RESOURCES MANAGEMENT COUNCIL (FARMC) AND CITY AGRICULTURAL AND FISHERY COUNCIL (CAFC) - Coastal Zone Mgt. Task force shall be strengthen to serve as a forum for coastal resources planning and perform function as provided for in Execution Order 240.

SECTION 57. - ZONING OF CITY WATERS - There is hereby adopted a zoning system for the City territorial waters which shall be developed and design hereafter based on an assessment of resources thereon and the most appropriate use for each zone. This scheme includes zones for:

- 1. Area for fish cages and fish pens
- 2. Area for baclad
- 3. Area for mussel and oyster beds
- 4. Area for operation of set traps
- 5. Area for sudsud base on motor cylinder tonnage

SECTION 58. - PROMULGATION OF A FISHERIES LICENSING SYSTEM - A licensing system shall be devised and implemented through the assistance of the coastal resource management committee and FARMC.

- 1. It shall be design on the basis of sustainable yield by the imposition of a limit on the number of license that shall be awarded to any type of gear.

2. The licensees shall be required to pay fees base on the scheduled revenue and shall be liable to compensate for any environmental damage which may result out of any form of irresponsible fishing practices at Malolos, Bulacan. It shall be consistent with the National Management principles adopted by other City Government sharing the same resources set by the FARMC.

SECTION 59. - ALTERNATIVE LIVELIHOOD PROVISION - The City Government through its Environmental Office shall pursue the development of livelihood diversification among coastal fisher folk, recognizing the participation of women and out of school youth. Livelihood project shall be directed at land-based opportunities in order to achieve a respite in fishing pressure.

SECTION 60. - ARTIFICIAL REEFS AND MANGROVE RESOURCE MANAGEMENT - Sangguniang Panlungsod resolution shall be passed to implement resource rehabilitation projects such as maintenance of established artificial reefs were fishing is not practice and mangrove rehabilitation/ maintenance/ reforestation in order to regain nursery grounds for fishes specially along the seashore of coastal barangays and sitios.

SECTION 61. - FISH SANCTUARIES AND MARINE RESERVES

61.1 The City Government may establish fish sanctuaries and marine reserves which shall be within a minimum of 10% of the total city worker as a basis for stock replenishment and to preserve bio-diversity it may also declare areas for sanctuaries/ marine reserves.

61.2 **Declaration of Mangrove Protected Areas (MPA's)**. It is hereby declared that the coastal areas within the territorial jurisdiction of the City of Malolos with a total area of 29.54 hectares as a Mangrove Protected Areas (MPA's).

All forms of cutting or uprooting of Mangroves without the necessary permit from the City Government of Malolos and other government agencies such as the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) are strictly prohibited.

The City Agriculture's office is hereby mandated to propagate, plant, cultivate and rehabilitate the Mangroves located in the coastal areas in coordination with the stakeholders such as the fisher folks, Barangay Officials, Non-Government Organizations (NGO's) and the National Government Agencies.

Each year, the City shall plant at least 20,000 propagules of mangroves in the MPA's; (Section 4, City Ordinance No.1-2018)

SECTION 62. - PRESERVATION OF ECOSYSTEM THAT SUPPORT COASTAL RESOURCES - The following measures are recommended for enactment to ensure that sustainable ecosystem in the coastal zone are conserved:

1. Enforcement of fishing laws through community assisted multi-sectoral approach. Task Force shall be intensified through the conduct of actual sea-borne operations.
2. Aquaculture activities shall be regulated.
3. Banning the construction of hotels or resorts facilities within 200 meters from the seashore.

SECTION 63. - PROHIBITING THE DISPOSAL OF DREDGE MATERIALS INTO THE SEA - The disposal of dredge materials into the sea is strictly prohibited within the jurisdiction of the City Government.

SECTION 64. - MANAGEMENT DIRECTION ON FISHERIES AND AQUATIC RESOURCES - It shall be the policy of the City Government to manage and conserve its natural resources, to obtain the optimum benefits there from and to preserve the same to the future generations. It shall also provide general measures through which the aforementioned policy may be carried out effectively. The City Government shall establish a system or rational exploitation of fisheries and aquatic resources within its territory and shall encourage citizen participation therein to maintain and/or enhance the optimum and continuous productivity of the same.

SECTION 65. - MEASURES FOR RATIONAL EXPLOITATION - Measures for the rational exploitation of fisheries and other aquatic resources may include, but shall not be limited to, the following:

1. Undertaking manpower and expertise development;
2. Acquiring the necessary facilities and equipment;
3. Regulating the marketing of threatened species of fish or other aquatic resources;
4. Reviewing all existing rules and regulations on the exploitation of fisheries and aquatic resources with a view of formulating guidelines for the systematic and effective enforcement thereof;

Conserving the vanishing species of fish and aquatic resources such as corals, as well as maintaining mangrove areas, marshes and inland areas, coral reef areas and other aquatic life.

CHAPTER IX
LAND USE MANAGEMENT


SECTION 66. - MANAGEMENT DIRECTION - It shall be the policy of the City Government to ensure the efficient utilization, renewal and conservation of all land resources within its jurisdiction for the benefit of its constituents, both in the present and future generations. It shall also provide for the protection and upholding of the rights of the citizens to a judicious and proper utilization of land resources and to all the benefits that may accrue from the development. All this is in line with the Constitution, the provision of the 1991 Local Government Code as well as the dictates of sustainable development.


The provisions under City Resolution No. 29-2019 also known as 'A CITY RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE COMPREHENSIVE LAND USE PLAN (CLUP) 2018-2026 OF THE CITY OF MALOLOS, PROVINCE OF BULACAN' and Zoning Ordinance No. 09-2019 are hereby adopted as an integral part of this Code.

SECTION 67. - IMPORTANCE OF LAND USE - Land and land-based resources are vital elements of human existence, its management shall be guided by:


- a. The principle of promotion, protection, enhancement and efficient use of environment.
- b. The integrity of eco-systems.
- c. Human health and socio-economic well-being of the citizens for sustainable development including the principle of ecological value maintenance and restoration of essential ecological processes and the preservation and prevention of laws on biological diversity.
- d. The principle of pollution prevention and waste reduction.
- e. The importance of reducing, re-using, recycling, and recovering (4R's) the products of society.



SECTION 69. - CLASSIFICATION ZONES

A. Agricultural and Fishpond Zone

There shall be an inventory of agricultural and fishpond lands which shall be maintained in its optimum productive state through innovative sustainable farming practices. Appropriate agricultural extension services and educational programs shall be institutionalized to ensure optimum productivity of the agricultural land. A monitoring system shall be established by the concerned local department to determine soil quality, improve production and prevent degradation of the topsoil in farm lands.

In all this endeavors, it shall be the policy of the City Government to seek, solicit and lobby for the technical and financial assistance of concerned national and foreign agencies.

B. Industrial Zone

It shall be the policy of the City Government to situate urban centers at a significant distance away from congested areas. It shall also consider that in establishing industrial zones and other areas for the concentration of infrastructures and facilities for its long-term effects on urbanization and stability of the land and its impact on waste disposal, soil erosion and human health shall be given priority.

The industrial uses which consists of garment factories, rice mills, iceplants and some medium scale industries has an area share of 137.10 hectares of 1.78 percent of the total land area. This industrial establishment is located in the different barangays, especially in Barangay Tikay and Santor where the First Bulacan Industrial City is located.

C. Commercial Zone

It shall be the policy of the City government that all establishments within the urban center shall be subject to environmental monitoring system to ensure that all establishments conform to environmental standards set by the local and national government.

The existing area for commercial land use is approximately 6.70 hectares or 0.09 percent of the total land area. Almost all commercial activities are done in the Central Business District and along the MacArthur Highway and other major roads.



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1. It is incumbent on all residents to properly handle, store and place the trash of households in the appropriate containers to facilitate orderly collection.
2. Residents shall attend and participate in the information campaigns to educate the people on proper garbage disposal and recycling. Where possible, households should be required to have individual/communal compost pits for the disposal of biodegradable waste materials and their conversion into fertilizer.
3. Households are required to segregate their waste into biodegradable, non-biodegradable and hazardous/toxic materials in coordination with the local waste collection unit.
4. All households are required to construct their own septic tanks.

An area of 2,995.82 hectares or 39.84 percent account for residential uses in all barangays, mostly along the transport lines of roadways and development of different subdivision. However, built individually apart from the settlement cluster rejoinder with other land uses. The physical profile of the land area reveals a contemporary and modern architectural desire with wood and concrete as the major structure components.

E. Institutional Zone

It shall be the policy of the City Government to require institutions to establish adequate waste treatment and disposal facilities in their premises.

The existing institutional use is about 101.64 hectares or 1.78 percent of the total land area. The structural composition of the institutional are made up of national and city government offices, health institution, private and public schools and churches which is located in within different barangays in the City.

E. Other Land Uses


The proximity of Malolos, Bulacan to the highly urbanized cities and municipalities makes it a potential catchment area for commercial and industrial investors.


1. With this foreseen development trend, changes in the city is inevitable. It is within this premises that this plan identified specific areas for each land uses, i.e., Residential, Commercial, Industrial investors.
2. Establish "Green Areas" as essential measures to reduce pollution, absorbers or excessive carbon dioxide and as areas for human recreation and cultural endeavors.




Greenbelt areas normally designated as parks should be situated between industrial and commercial areas and human settlements in order to serve as buffer zone and as noise breaker. The exact area to be designated as open space should be in conformity with the existing laws on that matter as prescribed in the National Building Code Act and the Urban Development and Housing Act of 1992.



4. Tourism Sites should be identified, promoted, enhanced and developed.



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- a. Restoration and preservation of historical places and sites as an adjunct to tourism promotion.
- b. Designated areas for tourism development shall become part of the Land Use Plan and Zoning Ordinance of the City Government where these areas are located. In developing these areas, a policy of ecological awareness, maintenance of ecological assets that from the very basis of the industries existence shall be promulgated by the DRT Government. It shall promote:

- 1. Anti-littering, and anti-vandalism as ordained in the Administrative Code of the City of Malolos.
- 2. The historical sites and places in the City of Malolos thru multi-media exposure.
- 3. The greening of street islands, as well as shoulders of all roads or streets in the town proper, barangay, in subdivisions, compounds and others shall be planted with shade or ornamental tress in a manner that is scientifically and agriculturally acceptable, or at intervals sufficient to provide the health growth of such flora.
- 4. Large scale business, with open spaces are required to plant trees as part of their plans.

5. The City Agriculture's Office shall Promote Backyard farming among the 51 Barangays and shall give assistance to the project.

The total land area for this use is about 582.91 hectares or 7.86 percent of the total land area. This includes parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, roads (public and private) and waterways in the City.

SECTION 70. - PROHIBITED ACTS ON PARKS - No person shall destroy the aesthetic beauty structure, including the picking of flowers, cutting of trees therein, vandalism and other detrimental act that will cause the disturbances of the general serenity of the parks.


SECTION 71. - TOURISM AREAS - Considered as tourism areas are the following:

- 1. Malolos Church
- 2. Malolos Museum

- 4. National Landmark (Barasoain Church)

- 6. And those area declared by the NHCP (Historical Town Declration)


SECTION 72. - PRESERVATION OF HISTORICAL BUILDING AND STRUCTURE - The preservation of historical buildings and relics is a primary concern of the City Government.

SECTION 73. LAND BASED POLLUTION - Pollution from land-based sources constitutes a serious threat to the environment and may affect all sectors of society in terms of hazards to health, contamination of food, loss of biodiversity and degradation of bodies of waters. Hence the following are prohibited acts:

- a. The deployment or utilization of extremely toxic and dangerous chemicals in any operational phase of factories, processing plants and agrochemical establishments including transport or transshipment within the boarders of the city taking into account the provisions of R.A. 6969 otherwise known as the Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Waste Control Act of 1990 and its implementing rules and regulations in DENR Department Administrative Order No. 29.



- b. Indiscriminate disposal of waste generated by hospital, funeral parlor, slaughterhouse, gasoline station and repair shop. No license or permit shall be issued to such establishments without the required waste disposal or treatment facilities.
- c. Hunting, destroying, removing or mere possession of endangered species of plants, animals and aquatic resources.
- d. All inventoried trees 5 years and above grown in public and private properties shall not be cut without first securing the necessary permits from the CEPO/DENR.
- e. Conversion of reserved prime agricultural lands for other land uses.
- f. Posting of any materials in public places without the necessary permits.
- g. Squatting or construction makeshift structures in both public and private properties that obstruct creeks esteros and similar waterways.
- h. Defecating and urinating in public places.

SECTION 74. - PERFORMANCE STANDARD ON ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT - All land uses, developments or construction must conform with the following standard:

- A. Noise and Vibrations** - All machineries producing noise and vibrations shall be enclosed in a building provided with effective noise-absorbing materials, noise silencers and mufflers, an open yard with a distance of not less than twenty (20) meters from the street or adjoining property lines and property planted trees as buffer to minimize vibrations. The machineries should be mounted on shock-absorbing mountinings such as cork set on reinforced concrete foundations or piles to reduce all noise and vibration to a reasonable minimum. Noise which is objectionable due to intermittent beat frequency or high pitch shall not be allowed unless enclosed in a sound proof building as tested and approved by the City Government Officials concerned.
- B. Smoke** - Any smoke emitted from any source for a period aggregating seven (7) minutes in any 30-minute interval particularly when starting a new fire shall have a density not greater than No. 2 of the Ringlemann Chart
- C. Dust, Dirt and Fly ash** - The emission of dust, dirt or fly ash from any source or activity which shall pollute the air and render it unclean, destructive, unhealthful or hazardous or cause visibility to be impaired shall not be permitted. In no case whatsoever shall dust, dirt or fly ash be allowed to exceed 0.68 grams per cu.m. nor to create haze with opaquences equivalent to or greater than No. 1 of the Ringlemann Chart.
- D. Odors and Gases** - The emission of foul odors and gases deleterious to public health or safety and general welfare shall not be permitted. Buildings and any activity emitting foul odors and/or obnoxious gases shall be enclosed in air-tight building and should be provided with air conditioning system, filter, deodorizers and other air-cleaning equipment.
- E. Glare and Heat** - Glare and heat from any operations or activities which create any nuisance or danger to adjoining properties, waterways or to the property shall not be allowed.
- F. Industrial Waste** - Industrial/plant waste shall be disposed of only in a manner which will not create nuisance or danger to adjoining properties, waterways or to the community in general.

Performance Standard for the disposal of manufacturing industries shall comply with the Water Receiving Standard set by the National Pollution Control Commission.

G. Sewage Disposal - No sewage dangerous to the public health, safety and general welfare shall be discharged into any public sewerage system, natural waterways or drainage channel. In addition to the following requirements, all sewerage shall comply with the National Pollution Control Commission.

Acidity or alkalinity shall be neutralized to a pH range of 6.5-8.5 as daily average on a volumetric basis with a temporary variation of pH 5.0 to 10.0. Wastewater shall not contain oil and grease in excess of 360 ppm.

SECTION 75. - ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT/STATEMENT - Environmental Impact Assessment or Statement shall not be required only from industries certified by the National Environmental Protection Council (NEPC) as well as any other activities as may be determined by HLURB as requiring such statement or assessment. The Environment Impact Assessment Statement shall indicate the following:

- a. Detailed description of the proposed plan or in the course or realization will interact with the proposed action to increase or reduce the environmental impact.
- b. Detailed description of the physical, biological and social environment within which the development or construction will occur.
- c. Detailed description of the probably direct and induced impact of the proposed action on the physical, biological and social environment.
- d. Comparison or impact alternative actions.
- e. Special emphasis on adverse effects, long term effects, resources commitments and cost benefits analysis.

SECTION 76. - POLLUTION CONTROL - For effective pollution control, all manufacturing industries must apply for locational clearance with the Deputized Zoning Officer, and other certificate of anti-pollution compliance from the National Pollution Control Commission.

SECTION 77. SPECIAL USE PERMIT - A special permit shall be required from each of the following uses subject to such terms and conditions as hereunder prescribed, to wit:


A. Dumping sites

- 1. Adequate fencing shall be put to prevent undue scattering of waste.
- 2. Rat and fly control and the general maintenance of the dumping site shall not be the sole responsibility of the applicant.
- 3. The dumping site shall not be located outside of the applicant's premises, if private, and shall be located within a reasonable distance of at least 200 m. from residential zones if public.
- 4. Other sanitary requirements of the local government shall be complied with.


B. Cemeteries


- 1. It shall be located at least 50 meters away from the nearest residential zone.
- 2. Its proper maintenance shall be the exclusive responsibility of the applicant or persons running them.
- 3. It shall be located in areas with high water table, waterbearing rocks or in areas with good soil permeability.
- 4. It shall be located or shall provide for an assessment or buffer zone of at least fifty (50) meters away from actual or potential ground water sources, banks of rivers or other bodies of water traversing or adjoining the same.



- 1. It shall be located within commercial zones.
- 2. Its maintenance shall be the exclusive responsibility of the applicant and/or persons running them.
- 3. Necessary requirements from concerned government agencies shall be complied with.

D. Private Landing Strips, Runways, Heliports and Helipads

- 1. It shall not be located within residential zones.
- 2. It shall be at least 100 meters away from the nearest residence.
- 3. A written authority to operate shall be obtained from the Civil Aeronautics Administration by the applicant at least 90 days before the intended date of operation and notices shall be posted and published in at least one of the daily newspaper to determine public opposition to the proposed landing site.
- 4. Sworn statement of the owners of the adjoining lands signifying their conformity to the proposed landing site shall be secured by the applicant even before the construction is started or not later than 30 days before the intended date of operation.

E. Filing Stations

- 1. It shall be located within a reasonable distance of not less than 100 meters from any school, church, hospital and other institutional buildings.
- 2. It shall not pose as hazard in the community developed entirely into residential purposes.

F. Open Storage

- 1. It shall not be nearer that 100 meters from any school, church, hospital, residents and other similar buildings.
- 2. Its proper maintenance shall be the responsibility of the applicant.

G. Cockpits


- 1. Its establishments shall only be allowed with the sanction of the concerned local government and the national government regulating body.
- 2. Its locations shall at least be 200 meters away from the nearest residential, commercial or institutional structures in the community.
- 3. Adequate off-street parking space, noise reduction facilities and buffer areas with a width of at least 3 meters and planted trees shall be provided.
- 4. It shall be located in an open space so as not to cause undue noise, annoyance, traffic hazard or other dangers to the safety and order of the community.




SECTION 78. - BUFFER STRIPS/EASEMENT - In the utilization, exploitation, development, conservation and protection of water resources, the following setbacks and/or easement along the entire length of the banks of rivers and streams should be observed:


- 1. Three (3) meters setback for all urban uses.
- 2. Ten (10) meters easement for all agricultural uses.
- 3. Twenty meters easement for all forest uses. The above setback may be used by the public for recreation, navigation, floatage, fishing, salvaging and other water-related activities.


SECTION 79. - CULTIVATION/UTILIZATION OF RIVER BEDS AND SANDBARS - No river bed and or sandbars shall be subject for cultivation or utilization except upon prior recommendation of the City Development Council and upon prior permission from the DPWH provided further that no permission shall be granted if it so obstructs the flow of water or it shall increase the flood vessels so as to cause damage to these areas.



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SECTION 80. - BUILDING PERMIT - The City Building Official shall implement the provision of the PD 1096 known as the Green Building Code.

No permit of occupancy shall be issued by the City Government for building, subdivisions, condominiums and the like unless these are provisions for planting of trees and flowers in the development plan duly implemented.

SECTION 81. - HEIGHT OF BUILDINGS - The height of buildings shall be decided and determined by the Building Official in accordance with existing laws and ordinances.

SECTION 82. - DEMOLITION OF CONDEMNED STRUCTURES - The demolition of condemned structures shall be three (3) months after inventory and proper identification of condemned building and structure with prior notice. The same shall be demolished at the owner's expense after the lapse of the 90-day notice to the owner, that the building shall be demolished.

SECTION 83. - SQUATTING - The City Government while recognizing its role in the allocation of property, equitable and sustainable land use, it further recognize its social and moral responsibility towards maintaining a sanitary and hygiene conditions in human settlements in order to achieve an effective environmental management. It shall be the policy of the City Government to contain and prevent the aggravation of squatter settlements within the City. The squatting in roadsides, waterways and similar areas is banned.

SECTION 84. - CONVERSION OF AGRICULTURAL LANDS - Malolos, being a fast growing town with a limited conversion of agricultural lands into other uses to ten percent (10%) provided that the subject conversion in not prime agricultural land and provided, further that there shall first issued a certificate from City Agricultural Office.

The expansion of economic activities and causing service effect on agricultural land due to housing program, commercial and industrial intervention and the growth of educational institution.


SECTION 85. - BAN IN CUTTING OF TREES


85.1 No person shall cut, burn, destroy or transplant any tree that has been inventoried without first securing the authority from the City Agriculturist and/or the nearest DENR Office. Any person or business entity who violates this ordinance shall be fined not less that five hundred pesos (P500.00) and not more than one thousand pesos (P1,000/.00). (Ordinance 5-97, Section 6).


All developers/contractors/owners of subdivisions located in the City of Malolos shall plant trees on the site development/subdivision equivalent to the number of units available for occupancy or units to be sold to the general public (1:1 ratio).


In cases of existing matured trees that needs to be cut down by the developer/owner/contractor, after securing the necessary cutting permit, shall refurbish the same equivalent to 1 matured tree cut is to 10 trees (1:10 ratio).


And shall maintain a mini forest within the open space allotted or at least 1% of the total land area of the subdivision but in no case shall be less than 1000 square meters with at least 75 trees. (Section 3, City Ordinance No. 38-2017)



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- 85.2 Unless provided the said requirements mentioned under Section 3 hereof in the Subdivision Plan or Project proposal, the Sangguniang Panlungsod shall deny the application of the developer/owner/contractor who failed to include the same in their application. (Section 4, City Ordinance No. 38-2017)
 - 85.3 The developer/owner/contractor shall submit an Affidavit of Undertakings before the Committee of the Whole during the pendency of their application for the approval of their Subdivision Plan stating that within three (3) years from approval of their subdivision plan they will comply with the provisions of this ordinance. (Section 5, Ibid)
 - 85.4 **PENALTY** - For the first year of violation (after the lapsed of three year period as provided under section 5) - fine of not less than 5,000.00 and/or imprisonment of not more than 30 days upon the discretion of the court;
For the second year of violation (after the lapsed of three year period as provided under section 5)- fine of not less than 5,000.00 and/or imprisonment of not less than 30 days but in no case more than 60 days upon the discretion of the court and revocation of their Development Permit. (Section 6, Ibid).
 - 85.6- It is hereby designate the 15th day of September of each year as "Arbor Day" or "Tree Planting Day" in the City of Malolos. (Kautusang Panlungsod Blg. 12- 2014)
 - 85.7 The provisions under City Ordinance No. 49-2020 also known as 'AN ORDINANCE MANDATING THE PRESERVATION AND PROTECTION OF CENTURY AND HERITAGE TREES IN THE JURISDICTION OF THE CITY OF MALOLOS, PROVIDING FOR PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF, APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES' is hereby adopted and form part of this Code.

SECTION 86. - COMPREHENSIVE, LAND USE PLAN AND CITY ZONING ORDINANCE - The comprehensive use plan and its accompanying zoning ordinance which was prepared before the enactment of this Code is hereby adopted. Its publication is a separate document does not affect its affectivity in relation to this Code that rather provision hereof consistent with land use and zoning are applicable to the land use plan and zoning ordinance.

SECTION 87. - QUARRYING - No permit/license shall be issued to any person, to conduct quarrying, extracting soils and other materials in all areas within Malolos jurisdiction without submitting concrete measures to protect the environment. Adjacent property owners' consent shall be required before any permit can be issued to persons engaged in quarrying.

SECTION 88. - SOIL CONSERVATION - The City Government, through the CEPO, shall likewise undertake soil conservation program including therein the identification and protection of critical watershed areas, encouragement of scientific farming techniques, physical and biological means of soil conservation, and short-term and long-term researches and technology for effective soil conservation.

SECTION 89. - USE OF FERTILIZERS AND PESTICIDES - The use of fertilizers and pesticides in agriculture shall be regulated, prescribing therefor a tolerance level in their use. Their use shall be monitored by the appropriate office concerned to provide empirical data for effective regulation.

SECTION 90. - MEASURES IN FLOOD CONTROL PROGRAM - In addition to the pertinent provisions of existing laws, the following shall be included in a soil erosion, sediment and flood control program of the City of Malolos:

1. The control of soil erosion on the banks of rivers;
2. The control of flow and flooding in and from rivers;
3. The conservation of water which, for purposes of this Section shall mean forms of water, but shall not include captive water;
4. The needs of fisheries and wildlife and all other recreational uses of natural water;

- 5. Measures to control the damming, diversion, taking, and use of natural water, so far as any such act may affect the quality and availability of natural water for other purposes; and
- 6. Measures to stimulate research in matters relating to natural water and soil to conservation and the application of knowledge they acquired.

**CHAPTER X
SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT**

SECTION 91. - STATEMENT OF SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT POLICY - It is the policy of the City Government to make Malolos a clean and green community with the school, the church and the home leading and exemplifying activities for the sanitation and enhancement of the environment through a sustained management of waste disposal.

SECTION 92. - CITY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT BOARD - The City Government shall establish a City Waste Management Board that shall prepare and implement a plan for the safe and sanitary management of solid waste generated in areas under its geographic and political coverage.

SECTION 93. - COMPOSITION OF THE SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT BOARD

Composition - The City Solid Waste Management Board shall be composed of the City Mayor as head with the following members:


- a. One representative of the Sangguniang Panlungsod, preferably chairpersons of either the Committees on Environment or Health, who will be designated by the presiding officer;
- b. President of the Association of Barangay Councils in the city;
- c. President of the Sangguniang Kabataan Federation;
- d. A representative from NGOs whose principal purpose is to promote recycling and the protection of air and water quality;
- e. A representative from the recycling industry;
- f. A representative from the manufacturing or packaging industry; and
- g. A representative of each concerned government agency possessing relevant technical and marketing expertise as may be determined by the Board.

The City Solid Waste Management Board may from time to time, call on any concerned agencies or sectors as it may deem necessary. Provided that representatives from the NGOs, recycling and manufacturing or packaging industries shall be selected through a process designed by themselves and shall be endorsed by the government agency representatives of the Board.

SECTION 94. - DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CITY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT BOARD - The City Solid Waste Management Boards shall have the following duties and responsibilities;


- 1. Develop the City Solid Waste Management Plan that shall ensure the long-term management of solid waste, as well as integrate the various solid waste management plans and strategies of the barangays in its area of jurisdiction. In the development of the Solid Waste Management Plan, it shall conducts consultations with the various sectors of the community.
- 2. Adopt measures to promote and ensure the viability and effective implementation of solid waste management programs in its component barangays.
- 3. Monitor the implementation of the City Solid Waste Management Plan through its various political subdivisions and in cooperation with the private sector and the NGOs.
- 4. Adopt specific revenue-generating measures to promote the viability of its Solid Waste Management Plan.




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5. Convene regular meetings for purposes of planning and coordinating the implementation of the solid waste management plans of the respective component barangays.
 6. Oversee the implementation of the City Solid Waste Management Plan.
 7. Review every two (2) years or as the need arises the City Solid Waste Management Plan for purposes of ensuring its sustainability, viability, effectiveness and relevance in relation to local and international developments in the field of solid waste management.
 8. Develop the specific mechanics and guidelines for the implementation of the Municipal Solid Waste Management Plan;
 9. Recommend to appropriate local government authorities specific measures or proposals for franchise or build-operate-transfer agreements with duly recognized institutions, pursuant to R.A. 6957, to provide either exclusive or non-exclusive authority for the collection, transfer, storage, processing, recycling or disposal of city solid waste. The proposals shall take into consideration appropriate government rules and regulations on contracts, franchises and build-operate-transfer agreements;
 10. Provide the necessary logistical and operational support to its component cities and municipalities in consonance with subsection (f) of Sec. 17 of the Local Government Code;
 11. Recommend measures and safeguards against pollution and for the preservation of the natural ecosystem; and
 12. Coordinate the efforts of its component barangays in the implementation of the City or Municipal Solid Waste Management Plan.


SECTION 95. - ESTABLISHMENT OF MULTI-PURPOSE ENVIRONMENT COOPERATIVES OR ASSOCIATIONS - Multi-purpose cooperative and associations that shall undertake activities to promote the implementation and/or directly undertake projects in compliance with the provisions of this Act shall be encouraged and promoted in every LGU.


SECTION 96. - THE COMPONENTS OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN - The solid waste management plan shall include, but not limited to the following components:


- a. **City Profile** - The plan shall indicate the following background information on the city and its component barangays, covering important highlights of the distinct geographic and other conditions;
 1. Estimated population of each barangay within the city and population projection for a 10-year period.
 2. Illustration of map of the city, indicating locations or residential, commercial and industrial centers, and agricultural area, as well as dump sites, landfills and other solid waste facilities. The illustration shall indicate as well, the proposed sites for disposal and other solid waste facilities.
 3. Estimated solid waste generation and projection by source, such as residential, market, commercial, industrial, construction/demolition, street waste, agricultural, agro-industrial, institutional, other wastes; and
 4. Inventory of existing waste disposal and other solid waste facilities and capacities.
- b. **Waste Characterization** - For the initial source reduction and recycling element of a local waste management plan, the City waste characterization component shall identify the constituent materials which comprise the solid waste generated within the jurisdiction of the City. The information shall be representative of the solid waste generated and disposed of within that area. The constituent materials shall be identified by volume, percentage in weight or its volume, percentage in weight or its volumetric equivalent,



Future revisions of waste characterization studies shall identify the constituent materials which comprise the solid waste disposed of at permitted at permitted disposal facilities.

c. **Collection and Transfer** - The plan shall take into account the geographic subdivisions to define the coverage of the solid waste collection area in every barangay. The barangay shall be responsible for ensuring that a 100% collection efficiency from residential, commercial, industrial and agricultural sources, where necessary within its area of coverage, is achieved. Toward this end, the plan shall define and identify the specific strategies and activities to be undertaken by its component barangays, taking into account the following concerns:

1. Availability and provision of properly designed containers or receptacles in selected collection points for the temporary storage of solid waste while awaiting collection and transfer to processing sites or to final disposal sites;
2. Segregation of different types of solid waste for re-use, recycling and composting;
3. Hauling and transfer of solid waste from the source or collection points to processing sites or final disposal sites;
4. Issuance and enforcement of ordinances to effectively implement a collection system in the barangay; and
5. Provision of properly trained officers and workers to handle solid waste disposal.

The plan shall define and specify the methods and systems for the transfer of solid waste from specific collection points to solid waste management facilities.


d. **Processing** - The plan shall define the methods and the facilities required to process the solid waste, including the use of intermediate treatment facilities for composting, recycling, conversion and other waste processing systems. Other appropriate waste processing technologies may also be considered provided that such technologies conform with internationally acceptable and other standards set in other laws and regulations.

e. The methods that the City will use to determine the categories of solid wastes to be diverted from disposal at a disposal facility through re-use, recycling and composting; and


f. New facilities and of expansion of existing facilities which will be needed to implement re-use, recycling and composting.

The city source reduction component shall include the evaluation and identification of rate structures and fees for the purpose of reducing the amount of waste generated, and other source reduction strategies, including but not limited to, programs and economic incentives provided under Sec. 45 of this Act to reduce the use of non-recyclable materials, replace disposable materials and products with reusable materials and products, reduce packaging, and increase the efficiency of the use of paper, cardboard, glass, metal, and other materials. The waste reduction activities of the community shall also take into account, among others, local capability, economic viability, technical requirements, social concerns, disposition of residual waste and environmental impact: Provided, That, projection of future facilities needed and estimated cost shall be incorporated in the plan.



The City Government recycling component shall describe methods for developing the markets for recycled materials, including, but not limited to, an evaluation of the feasibility of procurement preferences for the purchase of recycled products. Each City Government by determine and grant a price preference to encourage the purchase of recycled products.

The five-year strategy for collecting, processing, marketing and selling the designated recyclable materials shall take into account persons engaged in the business of recycling or persons otherwise providing recycling services before the effectivity of this Code. Such strategy may be based upon the results of the waste composition analysis performed pursuant to this Section or information obtained in the course of past collection of solid waste by the City Government, and may include recommendations with respect to increasing the number of materials designated for recycling pursuant to this Code.

The City Government recycling component shall evaluate industrial, commercial, residential, agricultural, governmental, and other curbside, mobile, drop-off, and buy-back recycling programs, manual and automated materials recovery facilities, zoning, building code changes and rate structures which encourage recycling of materials. The Solid Waste Management Plan shall indicate the specific measures to be undertaken to meet the waste diversion.

Recommended revisions to the building ordinances, requiring newly-constructed buildings and buildings undergoing specified alterations to contain storage space, devices or mechanisms that facilitate source separation and storage of designated recyclable materials to enable the local government unit to efficiently collect, process, market and sell the designated materials. Such recommendations shall include, but shall not be limited to separate chutes to facilitate source separation in multi-family dwellings, storage areas that conform to fire and safety code regulations, and specialized storage containers.


The Solid Waste Management Plan shall indicate the specific measures to be undertaken to meet the recycling goals pursuant to the objectives of this Code.

- h. Composting** - The composting component shall include a program and implementation schedule which shows the methods by which the City Government shall, in combination with the source reduction and recycling components, reduce a sufficient amount of solid waste disposed of within its jurisdiction to comply with the diversion requirements of Sec. 20 hereof.



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i. Solid waste facility capacity and final disposal - The solid waste facility component shall include, but shall not be limited to, a projection of the amount of disposal capacity needed to accommodate the solid waste generated, reduced by the following:

1. Implementation of source reduction, recycling, and composting programs required in this Section or through implementation of other waste diversion activities pursuant to Sec. 20 of this Code;
2. Any permitted disposal facility which will be available during the 10-year planning period; and
3. All disposal capacity which has been secured through an agreement with another City, or through an agreement with a solid waste enterprise.

The plan shall identify existing and proposed disposal sites and waste management facilities in the city of in other areas. The plan shall specify the strategies for the efficient disposal of waste through existing disposal facilities and the identification of prospective sites for future use. The selection and development of disposal sites shall be made on the basis of internationally accepted standards and on the guidelines.

Strategies shall be included to improve said existing sites to reduce adverse impact on health and the environment, and to extend life span and capacity. The plan shall clearly define projections for future disposal site requirements and the estimated cost for these efforts.

j. Education and public information - The education and public information component shall describe how the City Government will educate and inform its citizens about the source reduction, recycling, and composting programs.

The plan shall make provisions to ensure that information waste collection services, solid waste management and related health and environmental concerns are widely disseminated among the public. This shall be undertaken through the print and broadcast media and other government agencies in the city. The DepEd and Commission on Higher Education shall ensure that waste management shall be incorporated in the curriculum of primary, secondary and college students.

k. Special Waste - The special waste component shall include existing waste handling and disposal practices for special wastes or household hazardous wastes, and the identification of current and proposed programs to ensure the proper handling, re-use, and long-term disposal of special wastes.

l. Resource requirement and funding - The funding component includes identification and description of project costs, revenues, and revenue sources the City Government will use to implement all components of the City Government solid waste management plan.

SECTION 97. - SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL - Residential, Commercial and Institutional Wastes:


a. The following shall be the minimum standards and requirements for the garbage collectors:

- a.1 Properly equipped with protective gears and uniforms;
- a.2 With proper identification cards issued by the City Government;
- a.3 The City shall extend medical assistance to the collectors;

b. Solid waste disposal in the City Government level shall be by sanitary landfill, or in the meantime open dumpsite using spray chemicals to control flies, rodents and other scavenging animals.


Solid waste shall be stored, collected, processed, transported and disposed of in such a manner as to control dust emission, windblown materials, odors and prevent harborage for vermin and insects.



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- c. Households shall store waste in such a way that it is not health hazard, unsightly and cannot be considered a public nuisance.
 - d. The location of solid waste disposal sites shall conform with existing zoning, land use standards and pollution control regulations.
 - e. No person shall dump or dispose solid wastes into the river and any body of water, including riverbanks, where the wastes are likely to be washed into the water particularly piggery farms, poultry, etc.
 - f. Residuals of solid wastes after resource recovery, recycling and composting shall be disposed of by sanitary land filling.
 - g. No person shall store, collect, process, transport or dispose solid waste in such a manner as to cause pollution of the environment.

SECTION 98. - COLLECTION AND TRANSPORTATION OF SOLID WASTES

1. Residential Areas

- a. The concerned resident shall ensure that the solid waste is brought out in front of his gate/door and/or along the collection vehicle/cart, only during the collection period as scheduled.
- b. He shall report to the City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) any uncollected solid waste within the vicinity of his residence for proper action.
- c. Garbage not placed in containers may not be collected and treated as violating anti-littering and shall be penalized accordingly.
- d. The specific date and hour of garbage collection in particular locations shall be scheduled and announced for strict compliance.
- e. The Barangay Councils may enact their respective waste disposal systems, in consultation with their constituents.

2. Commercial Areas

- a. The owner/operator/lessee of any enterprise shall be responsible for the timely positioning of stored solid wastes during collection period which shall be made known in advance by the proper authorities which shall likewise assist whenever necessary in the sanitary in the sanitary means of loading wastes for collection purposes.
- b. He shall remind the City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) of uncollected solid wastes and other related matters.
- c. The Revenue Code shall impose appropriate garbage fees.

3. Institutional/Industrial Areas

- a. The head of any institutional/industrial establishment shall coordinate with CEPO in the orderly and sanitary way of collecting and transporting its solid waste.
- b. The collection and transportation of any hazardous or toxic wastes shall be strictly in accordance with the Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Waste Control Act of 1990 and its Implementing Rules and Regulations.

SECTION 99. - PROHIBITED ACTS

- a. Littering, throwing, dumping of waste matters in public places, such as roads, sidewalks, canals, esteros or parks, and establishments, or causing of permitting the same.
- b. Undertaking activities or operating, collecting or transporting equipment in violation of sanitation operation and other requirements or permits set forth in or established pursuant of this Code.
- c. The open burning of solid waste.
- d. Squatting in open dumps and landfills.
- e. Open dumping, burying of biodegradable or non-biodegradable materials in flood prone areas.

- f. The manufacture, distribution or use of non-environmentally acceptable packaging materials.
- g. Transport and dumping of collected domestic, industrial, commercial and institutional wastes in areas other than dump sites prescribed under this Code.
- h. The use of Public Toilet - All users of public toilet are prohibited from throwing sticks, papers, tissue papers inside the toilet bowl should dispose them in waste can provided for the purposes.
- i. No Spitting in Public Places and Theater - Spitting is strictly prohibited to prevent unsanitary surroundings.
- j. Proper Disposal of Barber Shops and Beauty Parlors - Prohibits and orders all owners, operators of barber shop and beauty parlors to dispose their wastes (hair and garbage) properly in trash can.
- k. Burning of Garbage - No person, commercial manufacturing and industrial establishment shall burn his garbage, refuse or trash and flammable chemical residues such as aerosol, spraynets and other toxic materials.
- l. Anti-Littering - The throwing and/or scattering of dirt, papers refuse or any other materials considered waste and urinating on public streets, fences, sidewalks, public parks, public edifices is strictly prohibited.

The following activities shall constitute an illegal act:


- a. Construction of a dam, dike, fishing gear and other similar structure causing obstruction on any portion of irrigation and drainage canal;
- b. Utilization of any portion of irrigation and drainage canals for grazing of work animal wherein such animal is forced to wallow and cross said canals;
- c. Construction of any turnout without permission and authority from concerned authorities;
- d. Dumping of garbage, debris, or dead animals in the irrigation canals, creek, drainage canal or river;
- e. Illegal manipulation of any turnout, check structure or head gate;
- f. Destruction, removal and/or theft of steel gates and other movable structure;
- g. Damage to or destruction on any portion of irrigation service roads;
- h. Dumping of dead animals or waste disposals from the piggery to the canals, creeks or river;
- i. Grazing of ducks in the irrigation canal or creeks;
- j. Permitting his animal to graze or wallow in and across any portion of irrigation or drainage canal and grazing of ducks.
- k. Tethering of carabaos, cows and goats on the NIA Road.
- l. Illegal manipulation of any turnout, check structure or head gate.
- m. Dumping of garbage debris or dead animals, and piggery waste.
- n. Construction of any turnout without permission and authority from concerned authorities.


Reparation of Damages - Notwithstanding the penalties provided for in the immediately preceding section, any person or entity found guilty of any of the illegal acts, shall be held criminally liable therefore in accordance with the provision of the Revised Penal Code and civilly liable pursuant to the Civil Code.

The following provisions are existing City Ordinances and restated herein:

a. Solid Waste Collection - Garbage Container

**CHAPTER XI
HAZARDOUS AND TOXIC MATERIALS**

SECTION 100. - GAS STATIONS - Gasoline stations shall be located within reasonable distance from schools, churches hospitals and residential houses. Those already constructed within the residential areas should be relocated. They should not in any contribute as hazards a community development entirely into residential purposes.

SECTION 101. - OPERATION OF GASOLINE STATIONS - All gasoline stations operating within the city shall install oil and water separation facility including sealed receptacles for the storage of used oil and grease. This shall form art of the pre-condition requirements before the issuance of business permits by the City Government.

Operator shall ensure that their underground storage, is always in good condition by undertaking periodic check-up, maintenance monitoring of fugitive effluents.


They should also ensure the safety of their gasoline stations from fire and explosion hazard by installing appropriate gadgets and devices to prevent gaseous of fume emissions detrimental to the health of the general public.


SECTION 102. - DISPOSAL OF WASTE MATERIALS - All owners/administrators of gasoline stations and all establishment using toxic chemicals in the manufacture of their products are prohibited to drain their waste directly to rivers and creek without purifying first the waste sedimentary or construct sewage canals with a provision for sedimentation to prevent pollution.


SECTION 103. - TOXIC SUBSTANCE AND HAZARDOUS WASTE CONTROL - The City Government shall require all persons and entities dealing with toxic substances and hazardous material to fully comply with full disclosure procedures in the following manner:


- a. Manufacturers are required to present materials fact sheets which should explain or described the quantity, toxicity, ignitable, flammability and leaching potentials of the chemicals manufactured.
- b. Transporters are required to the municipality ahead of time a manifest which shall contain the material fact sheets, the origin and destination of the materials in transport, the transit time and the route where the hazardous on toxic materials will traverse.
- c. Primary users are required to present to the city government and maintain the periodic inspection by competent authorities, disclosure, document which will contain the quantity of the chemicals, type of use, storage of facilities and safety installed.
- d. Secondary users shall likewise be required to submit to the municipality and maintain for periodic inspection by competent authorities a disclosure document similar to that required of the primary users.


All users of fertilizers, pesticides and other farm chemicals shall observe precautionary measures in handling, applying storage and disposal as well as safety as indicated on the levels of the chemicals and instruction of farm technicians.







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**CHAPTER XII
OTHER HEALTH RELATED PROVISIONS**

SECTION 104. - PUBLIC MARKET - The general sanitation and cleanliness of the public market in the City of Malolos shall always be strictly observed.

No person shall be allowed to use the public market as residential place domiciles or as sleeping quarters.

SECTION 105. - OPERATION OF SLAUGHTERHOUSES - All public slaughterhouses shall be equipped with appropriate and adequate disposal facilities for solid discards and wastewater, as well as disinfections system for the maintenance of hygiene conditions within their premises.

SECTION 106. - CEMETERY AND MEMORIAL PARK - The provision of a cemetery is one of the basic facilities to be established for the general welfare of the construction in the city. There shall be a permanently appointed cemetery, caretakers to see to it that the cemetery shall be used exclusively for the interment of bodies and due respect for the death.

There is no available space for cemetery expansion several memorial parks have developed.

**CHAPTER XIII
CONTINUING COMMUNITY EDUCATION**

SECTION 107. - MANAGEMENT DIRECTION - Environment Management is not management of resources per se, it is management of people. A continuing community education ensures the cultivation of environment-friendly lifestyle and concretizes sustainable use practices among individuals and industries alike. In its socio-political sense, community education enables the people to critically understand the environment problems and mobilize total efforts toward the fruition of a goal-oriented ecological balance.

SECTION 108. - LIAISON WITH EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS - The City through the City Trainings and Liaison Office, shall liaison with public and private schools with the end in view of including environment-friendly activities in their curriculum and make available to the City Government research papers on environment.

SECTION 109. - COMMUNITY ASSEMBLIES - Community assembly in each barangay shall be conducted at least twice in a year purposely for environmental management awareness. This shall be conducted jointly by the barangay council, CEPO, NGOs and Resource persons from other government agencies.


SECTION 110. - MULTI-MEDIA INTERVENTION

- a. The City Government shall tap tri-media to sustain environmental awareness and to harness maximum participation of the community.
- b. The City Government shall continuously conduct public addresses for its battlecry, jingles, slogans, advertisements and similar educational projects.



SECTION 112. - LINKAGES WITH SCIENTIFIC INSTITUTIONS - With the best efforts, there shall be established enduring linkages with government and non-government research and scientific institutions to avail of technologies and research studies for the benefit of the communities and the inhabitants thereof. The City Government shall maintain linkages with scientific institutions like DA, DOST, DENR and their respective subordinate bureaus to ensure information updates and technical assistance on environment.

Section 113. - Barangay-Based Environmental Education - The Barangay Councils in coordination with NGO's operating therein shall institute trainings and seminars in the barangay, conducted singly or as a cooperative undertaking among barangays. This is in relation to community assemblies. The barangays shall install their respective environment code as educational tools and operational measures on environmental initiatives.

CHAPTER XIV
MONITORING, EVALUATION AND FEEDBACK MECHANISM

SECTION 114. - MANDATORY REVIEW - The mandatory review of this Code by the Oversight Committee shall be once every three years.


SECTION 116. - MONITORING DEVICE ON IMPLEMENTATION OF CODE



- c. Public consultations and symposia shall be institutionalized as part of the policy-making process.



SECTION 118. - EXECUTIVE LEGISLATIVE CONTINUUM - The Legislative-Executive Consultative Committee created by virtue of Section of Ordinance No. C-002 shall be the primary instrument of maintaining the continuing cooperation and coordination between the local executive and the Sangguniang Panlungsod for optimum efficiency and effectiveness of local governance.

CHAPTER XV
MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

SECTION 120. - INTER-CITY COOPERATION - The City Government shall strive to cooperate with neighboring municipalities for the latter to enact their respective Environmental codes to optimize the common benefits derived therefrom.

SECTION 121. - FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO TASK FORCES AND BOARDS - The City Mayor is hereby encouraged to issue administrative or executive orders authorizing the payment of per diems to non-government personnel while attending meetings of the Task Forces and various Boards and meal allowances to government personnel while in field operations.


SECTION 122. - BUDGETARY ALLOCATION - At least 10% of the City Training Fund from the General Fund shall be allocated to the training activities envisioned in this code.


SECTION 123. - ROLE OF NON-GOVERNMENT ORGANIZATIONS - To decentralize responsibility for environment protection and conservation and ultimately empower communities without using the coercive power of the state, the strategic partnership with NGOs, People Organizations and similar community associations shall be considered by the municipal government to strengthen their capacities immediately reshape local programs, policies and activities as a sharing exercise in maintaining ecological balance. NGOs shall participate in public consultations called for by national government agencies authorizing or involved in the planning and implementation of any project or program that may cause pollution, climatic change, depletion of non-renewable resources, loose of cropland, rangeland, of forest cover and extinction of animal or plant species, in order that the community or inhabitants they represent will understand the impact upon the people in terms of environmental or ecological balance and the measures that will be undertaken to prevent or minimize the adverse effect thereof. Section 2 © of RA 7160 states: "It is likewise the policy of the State to require all national agencies and offices to conduct periodic consultations with appropriate local government units, non-governmental and people's organizations, and other concerned sectors of the community before any project or program is implemented in their respective jurisdiction.


SECTION 124. - ROLE OF GOVERNMENT AGENCIES - The City Government shall avail of the duties of national government agencies to local government units, particularly, but not limited to the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Department of Agriculture (DA), Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR), Department of Health (DOH), Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) in the planning and implementation of programs and projects involving environmental initiatives.



SECTION 126. - INSTITUTIONAL AWARDS - There is hereby institutionalized the GAWAD KALIKASAN to be awarded to any person, Sangguniang Barangay, NGO or private establishment who excel in environmental activities in accordance with established criteria by the Incentive Awards Board in addition to other emoluments or benefits that may be given. The awarding ceremonies should coincide with celebrations of the city's foundation day.

SECTION 127. - ECONOMIC INSTRUMENT - The City Government shall extend all possible assistance to any person engaged in the recovery, re-use, re-cycle and other economic activities related to environment protection and conservation. Cooperatives undertaking this kind of activity as a livelihood project shall be extended loans, grants, or subsidies in accordance with the Implementing Rules and Regulations to be issued in connection hereof/and in furtherance of Section 36 of the Local Government Code of 1991.

SECTION 128. - COMMITMENT - The City Government hereby commits its human, fiscal and technical resources to attain the VISION of the City of Malolos as state in Section 12 hereof and to the effective and efficient implementation of this Code regardless of political affiliations, boundaries and tenure of office.

**CHAPTER XVI
PENALTIES AND SANCTIONS**

SECTION 129. - COMMON PENALTIES - Failure on the part of any person to comply with any of the obligatory provisions or who violates any of the prohibited acts of this Ordinance, in the absence of a specific penalty, shall suffer, upon conviction, the payment of a fine of One Thousand Pesos (P1,000.00) to Five Thousand Pesos (P5,000.00) or imprisonment of five (5) days to six (6) months or both fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 130. - SANCTIONS - If the person found guilty of any violation hereof in the official performance as President, Chairman, Executive Officer or duly authorized representative of any business enterprise operating under a Mayor's permit, the City Mayor may suspend or revoke the permit so granted.

SECTION 131. - LEGAL ENFORCEMENT - Should it be necessary that legal action should be undertaken to enforce any provision of this Code, the Task Force or Legal and Legislative Action shall institute the appropriate proceedings.

**CHAPTER XVII
FINAL PROVISION**

SECTION 132. - AMENDATORY CLAUSE - All City Ordinances, Executive Orders issued by the City Mayor or parts thereof inconsistent with this Code are deemed repealed and amended accordingly.

SECTION 133. - SEPARABILITY CLAUSE - Should any part or portion of this Code be declared null and void by the Courts, the remaining portion not affected thereby shall continue to have the full force and effect of law.

SECTION 134. - EFFECTIVITY - This Code shall take effect immediately after approved and it's complete publication in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation.
